



Confirmation and Easter

You may have seen some images on Facebook of me teaching in our school. I was teaching our 7th graders about Confirmation since they will receive the sacrament in early November of this year. Confirmation is a singular and unique sacrament for an individual in their faith, but I also believe what I presented is useful and relevant to us as a parish.

During Easter, in place of the Nicene Creed, we renew our baptismal promises. Confirmation is an acknowledgment of those same promises. As such we, as Christians, confirm our faith when we consider our baptism.

Baptism is the foundation of our faith. It is the groundwork of any future sacrament. Here are three things that I see as essential to this Baptism: The Greatest Commandment, Faith, and Prayer.



Faith is sometimes considered a sort of knowledge, but it is much more. Faith is a kind of trust, belief, and relationship too. Trust is important, but it cannot be blind. In our lives, trust is built and earned over time. Our belief too comes from experiences. Our character is tested by how we act in good times and in bad—do we seek God at all times and look for Him?

Faith is a relationship because faith *should* always grow and develop. We learn to love in difficult times and in happy times. One way of putting it: we learn to believe and love in poverty and prosperity.

Prayer, lastly, is communication with God. The foundation of prayer is in love and faith. We can pray alone, but the full expression of a Christian's prayer is in the community and in the sacraments. We must become a people of prayer – our Baptism urges us to be that people of prayer.

As a parish, we must see prayer as part of communication. Prayer is the breath and voice of a community that seeks God. Our Baptism allows us, through the Spirit, to speak, listen, and discern through faith.

When you renew your Baptismal promises this Easter, I encourage you to consider these three points and confirm in yourselves these attitudes:

- 1) I want to grow in love of God and others.
- 2) I want to grow in my relationship with God and others, proving my character with how I treat them.
- 3) I want to speak of God in my heart and with others more openly and listen to others with genuine love.

In this way we can renew our Baptism, but in service of building the Kingdom of God.

- Public Relations/Marketing







Gospel Meditation - Encourage a Deeper Understanding of Scripture



Any builder worth his or her salt knows the value and importance of a cornerstone. Properly laying and securing this primary unit determines how the rest of the project unfolds and its success. Cornerstones are necessary elements not only of buildings but of lives as well. Many human beings conduct the business of their lives paying little attention to a grounding reference or starting point. Hence, what unfolds is a tapestry of relativism, with few anchors or guideposts and many impulsive choices. Some consider love to be their cornerstone. While this may sound attractive and useful, the pursuit of love without a simultaneous pursuit of its source

can be shallow and self-focused. Just because a person chooses to do no harm and love others does not mean that they are living in truth and properly anchored to the real cornerstone.

Jesus is the true and authentic cornerstone and shepherd. It is only in following the Risen One as the way, the truth, and the life that we can move from being well grounded ethical people to properly focused moral ones. Proper conduct, a true sense of justice, wisdom, virtue, moral principles, faith, hope, and love will be difficult to find unless we listen to the right Voice. It is when we learn to listen to the voice of God that we begin our journey on the road to salvation. It is only the Good Shepherd, the authentic and solid cornerstone, who can guide us through life's questions and challenges and bring us to the safe and proper pasture.

A person's life only has meaning when the cornerstone is properly selected and set. Understanding themselves only as random acts of creation, existing without intent or purpose, will color their choices and influence their decisions. The foundation of their lives will be simply a matter of preference and choice, leaving benchmarks of growth and higher ideals optional to pursue. Whereas people who believe that they are fashioned and loved into existence by a God who purposely made them, have this incredible unconditional relationship at their source which has tremendous significance. Their allegiance is not to themselves but to their Creator. Life, then, is an adventure in search of this Creator God and a journey of self-discovery that seeks to unite their will to His. There is a cost. We have to give up our life in order to gain our life. As ironic as that sounds, it is true. It is only when we finally figure this out that the true cornerstone of our lives will be properly laid and we can, with God's help, get about the business of properly constructing a temple that endures. ©LPi

Are you expecting happiness, peace, contentment or justice to come from any place other than God? "It is better to take refuge in the Lord than to put confidence in princes," the Psalms tell us. Well, I've never put much confidence in princes. But when it comes to problems, I often find myself telling God to take a step back — "I've got this."

It's tough to pray about any problem as much as you talk about it. We want so badly to tackle the issue ourselves. But I'll let you in on a secret: it doesn't matter what the question is, we don't have the answer. Take it to the One who does. — Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS ©LPi
