

Fruitful Harvest Session II: A Recap

It was a pleasure to have our seminarians lead a brief reflection last Sunday, March 27th. Deacon Joseph, preparing for Ordination to the Priesthood in June, and Joseph and Colin, both from Kansas, each reflected upon "*The Gift of Relationships*" during session 2 of our 3-part series entitled "*Fruitful Harvest: Perspectives from a Seminarian's Journey*."

Session 1 focused on formation. Formation, in short form, refers to how one prepares for the priesthood, i.e., how one forms himself to the person of Christ the Priest. Every Christian, however, through their Baptism enters into formation as well.

Formation looks at how we physically, emotionally, spiritually, and intellectually grow. Formation does not make us into a new person. It takes who we are, the person called by God, and seeks to transform that individual according to His Love.

Building from that, we reflected on relationships. We are our relationships, as the foundations of our personality are based upon our families and our neighborhood. Our character is proven by the relationships we form and invest in. In essence, how we "*love God and love our neighbor*" characterizes our Christian vocation.

Colin began our reflection by referencing a formation talk given by a lay staff member at Mundelein. In it, she had reflected on how families in her neighborhood come together to pray and discuss topics. They allow their children to play together in the back or downstairs, while they invest in time together as adults for prayer, discussion, and developing their friendships. Colin noted that it inspired him to examine his own relationships and how he might be more intentional in that regard. Relationships, while good, are not enough in and of themselves, as simply *having* a relationship is not the end goal. *Growing* in a relationship is something we can all strive for, with God and with each other.

Having reflected on how a relationship with a stranger or guest can change us, Deacon Joseph then spoke about a teacher of his when he was a young boy: Sister Mary Jean. He spoke of her tough-but-fair style of teaching, which was always supported by great care and love for her students and others. Sister Mary Jean taught him valuable lessons about prayer and attitudes of prayer that he still carries with him today. Though she passed away when he was in middle-school, Deacon Joseph recounted how he witnessed her being active in their community, reaching out to the poor and inspiring others to

good works. It demonstrates the power a good teacher, mentor, and community member can be for others.

Lastly, Joseph spoke in session 1 about his family's devotions to the Holy Family and other saints. From there, he spoke about the moments he and his family spent together: specifically, Sunday Brunch and evening Holy Hours with his parents and 8 siblings. While Joseph at times struggled as a teen with prayer and engaging in things that seemed rote, he also looks back now on moments with his younger siblings (he's the eldest) as moments of connection and prayer. He even mentioned that his little siblings expressed a simple and childlike relationship to God, in the most positive sense of the word. One

such quote from a then 8-year-old sibling: "A relationship with God isn't a game of hide and seek, but more like a game of 'I spy'," which still stands out to him all these years later. Our time with family is precious and brief, so filling that time with prayer allows God to bless that sacred time together.

I hope you all can join us for our last session on **Sunday**, **May 1**st at **11:30 A.M.** which will focus on "*The Gift of Prayer.*" Small group discussion is a great way to meet your neighbor, to know and understand them – and

ultimately, to love them. Consider reserving a little bit of your time to support our seminarians, invest in our parish community, and grow in your faith.

Tope Tweet of the Week...

"We need to reject war, a place of death where fathers and mothers bury their

children, where men kill their brothers and sisters without even having seen them, where the powerful decide and the poor die."



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In the Gospel for Mass on the Tuesday of the Fourth Week of Lent, which fell on March 29th this year, we hear recounted the familiar story of Jesus encountering several people who are ill, including one who had been that way for an exceptionally long period of time, some thirty-eight years according to the text. Perplexed that this man had been suffering for so long and that he had remained sitting by the side of the pool for that length of time, Jesus asks him if he, indeed, wants to get well. To this, the man responds that "I have no one to put me into the pool when the water is stirred up..." Jesus' response is simple and succinct: "Rise, take up your mat, and walk."

There are a few ways to look at this incident, but I think an effective one is to consider that the man who had been lying on his mat for thirty-eight years had been suffering from numerous spiritual, and not physical, ailments. Perhaps he suffered from some kind of mental illness or, what is also possible, is that he had simply given up on everything and now was trying to say that he could not do what he needed to do because of the inattention, real or imagined, of other people. In effect, he was doing what a lot of people tend to do and that is to simply look for excuses when they are not doing what they know they need to be doing. In any time, but especially now, having endured two years of the pandemic (a period that certainly felt like thirty-eight years), along with all the many other problems currently plaguing our society, it is very easy and understandable that we might fall into this kind of despair and to rationalize why we are getting further away from being our best selves. When that happens, remember the words of Jesus here, "Rise, take up your mat, and walk." In other words, face up to what might be bringing you down, because you are so much stronger than it is. Indeed, what is keeping you down is your "mat" and, by definition, your mat is something that is beneath you, so walk confidently in the direction that you know you need to be going.

It is also worth asking ourselves, in light of this Gospel, why people so often pursue their professional lives so much more assiduously than they do their personal and spiritual lives. Many years ago, in the center of Buenos Aires, the hometown of Pope Francis, a pair of birds made their nest at the top of a monument in the center of the city. On three occasions, city workmen went up to the top of the monument and removed the nests, only to have the birds come back and put their nests back up there each time. After the third time, the people who lived in the area insisted to the workers that they let the birds stay. While the persistence of the workmen is certainly commendable in this situation, it can leave us asking how much benefit we might have in our lives if we applied this same level of persistence to our spiritual lives. In light of our Gospel, then, whenever you feel yourself being brought down by something, remember Jesus' succinct message: rise and walk. - Fr. Robert

Gospel Meditation - Encourage a Deeper Understanding of Scripture

We love to make examples out of those who have erred and done wrong. Publicly punishing others serves as a means of demonstrating the consequences for what is deemed inappropriate or wrongful behavior. While this may appear an effective way of achieving conformity to established rules, it runs the real risk of distorting motivation. Obviously, we want people to do what is right and pursue

healthy, virtuous behaviors and ideals. But is fear of punishment ever the best motivation for avoiding one action in favor of another?

Doing something out of fear is never healthy. Focusing exclusively on our behavior and what others expect or think, leads to living life with a self-focused superficiality. We become more concerned about protecting ourselves from something negative and unpleasant, than investing ourselves in the freedom, wonder and awe of being human! We can still find our way to the unacceptable or inappropriate behavior as long as we do not get caught! Being a whole, focused, and God-centered human being requires more. It demands an investment of the heart. Virtuous, moral, and mature lifestyles reflective of the Gospel necessitate love.

When we experience and recognize love, God's unconditional love, in the depth of our soul, we fall in love with what we have found. We then find ourselves leaving destructive and sinful actions behind in search of something more holy, dignified, true, integral, and loving. This is really *"mercy realized."* God's tremendous, loving, eternal forgiveness and willingness to bring us back to something more real and tender is transformational. The respect for myself that I receive from God is so life changing that it causes me to run quickly away from anything sinful and self-destructive to things that are whole and holy.

There are many people who want nothing more than to judge or criticize us. What would actually stoning the woman caught in adultery really accomplish? Nothing more than the inflation of the already self-righteous egos of a few men who think they have power. They have no power because they are sinners too, just like everyone else. What all of us have is the humble ability to express sorrow for pursuing destructive thoughts and actions and receive the power of God's mercy. Then, Jesus' request to "*go and sin no more*" will be one we proudly heed and follow. ©LPi
