# Reflections from Fr. Robert Carlton: Saint Maximilian Kolbe



On August 14th, the Church marked the anniversary of the death of Saint Maximilian Kolbe, who died in Auschwitz in 1941 and is the figure that Pope John Paul II declared the "Patron Saint of Our Difficult Century." Kolbe was born in 1894 in what is now Poland and who, even at the age of 12, felt a strong connection to Mary. He described one vision he had of her at that age: "That night I asked the Mother of God what was to become of me. Then she came to me holding two crowns, one white, the other red. She asked me if I was willing to accept either of these crowns. The white one meant that I should persevere in purity and the red that I should become a martyr. I said that I would accept them both." In 1907, Kolbe and his brother joined the Conventual Franciscans, eventually getting ordained in 1918. He returned to Poland after that where he variously served as a professor and operator of a religious publishing press. In 1930,

he went to Japan to serve as a missionary and founded a Catholic monastery in Nagasaki, which survived World War II.

Kolbe, though, is most well-known and remembered today for his actions during World War II and principally during his time at Auschwitz. After World War II started in 1939, Kolbe continued his work at a monastery in Poland, where, among other things, he set up a makeshift hospital. The monastery was shut down, however, in February 1941 by the Nazis and Kolbe and four others were arrested. In May of that year, Kolbe was transferred to Auschwitz. At the end of that summer, someone from Kolbe's barracks managed to escape and, as a result, the Nazis picked ten people at random to be executed as a reprisal. One of the ten selected was Francis Gajowniczek, who, when he realized that he was one of the ten chosen, asked what would happen to his wife and children. Seeing the response of Gajowniczek, Kolbe volunteered to take his place and was then led, with the other nine to the bunker where, in two weeks, they all had died.

The story, though, did not end this way. Gajowniczek ended up spending five years, five months and nine days in concentration camps and was liberated in 1945 reuniting with his wife. He lived long enough to be the guest of Pope Paul VI in 1971 when Kolbe was beatified for his martyrdom and also was the guest of Pope John Paul II at Kolbe's canonization in 1982. Gajowniczek spent the rest of his life – and it was a long life as he died in 1995 - traveling the world and speaking about the sacrifice Kolbe had made for him. On one of his last trips to the United States, he ended his talk by reminding his audience that "Saint Maximilian Kolbe did not die just for me. He died for all of you – to show all of you that love without limits is possible. They burned his body, but his ashes have spread to the ends of the world." Pope John Paul II echoed this and spoke of the consequences of only seeking power when he went to visit Auschwitz after he became Pope: "Where power is at work more than love, people seek their own interests and not those of Jesus Christ, and accordingly they easily depart from the rule of God's law..." Let us give thanks for the life of Maximilian Kolbe and also strive to follow his example of practicing charity without limits.





Registration for our IC Religious Education Program will be held online beginning on **Wednesday**, **September 1**<sup>st</sup> and will conclude on **Friday**, **September 10**<sup>th</sup>

# First Day of Class: Wednesday, September 15th – 4:00-5:00 P.M.

Our Religious Education classes will be held primarily online for this School Year and will be taught by IC School Professional Teachers (most at the grade level they teach daily.) Classes will meet virtually on a weekly basis on **Wednesdays** from **4:00-5:00 P.M.** via Zoom Video Conferencing. This year, all grade levels will also meet in-person for Religious Education Class on certain dates.

# Gospel Meditation - Encourage a Deeper Understanding of Scripture



"Far be it from us to forsake the Lord for the service of other gods." We struggle with our gods. They appear in the forms of things like money, power, prestige, popularity, privilege, and self-fulfillment. We like these "gods" because they make us feel good and ask very little of us in return. When we worship them, we worship ourselves. How can you go wrong with that? We buy into the illusion that if something can give us a comfortable life, free of want and need, then it is worth setting other things aside to pursue it. In essence, we sell our souls. Our struggle with "who is God" and to whom do we belong is a real one and one that can easily find us empty and experiencing disillusionment.

The devil tempted Jesus in the desert and promised him more. We are promised "more." But in pursuing the more and the satisfying we lose track of the cost, and the cost is great. We sacrifice our very life in pursuit of something disguised as life. We sacrifice truth for something that only "feels" true. While the true and real God certainly promises us many things, many things are also required. It is not about the warm and secure feelings and self-absorption the world wants to provide, but of giving back. There can be no lukewarm stance with regard to faith. If we are in, then faith in Jesus Christ asks us to do some difficult things: work in service of God's kingdom (not our own), love our enemies, offer no resistance to injury, that we must die to ourselves in order to find ourselves, and trust that Jesus truly gives us his flesh and blood to eat and drink. These are hard things to accept and even harder to put into practice. It is no wonder that many, who may be attracted to Jesus at first, walk away in pursuit of the more self-satisfying gods.

But truth is truth. If we cannot accept it from the lips of Jesus Christ, then where else will we find it? To whom can we go? There is only one source of truth and life, Jesus Christ. Jesus has the words of eternal life and if we do not go to him, then where else will we find this gift? But we must be faithful and buy into the whole package deal that requires sacrifice and fidelity. When we do, we find ourselves, through the Body and Blood of Christ, connected to the Source of all life and then intimately bound with our brothers and sisters. We all have to decide whether we want to stay or go and if we can accept what Jesus has to say. It's a choice we all have to make. ©LPi
