Dear brothers and sisters,

On June 27th, Fr. Matthew made a formal announcement of our Evangelization Team and requested that you pray for us, as well as our Alpha Team. From the bottom of our hearts, the teams and I thank you for your prayers and support.

The development of an Evangelization Team is a directive promoted and supported by our Archdiocese in conjunction with the *Renew My Church* campaign. I became aware of this directive at the *Renew My Church Summit* in 2018. At this time, I was introduced to Alpha as well.

Over the last three years, I've been working closely with Fr. Robert (Fedek) and Fr. Matthew to build and solidify an Alpha Team for IC. I'm grateful for the experience and happy to report that IC now has a solid team in place for Alpha. Please continue to pray for our Alpha @ IC Team as Alpha becomes fully ingrained within our culture at IC.



The next leg of my journey is to develop and construct an Evangelization Team. This task is a little trickier as the team and I attempt to discover and define what Evangelization actually is. And once defined, how is it implemented? And once implemented, how do these actions begin to impact the culture of IC?

As the Evangelization Team and I chart a path forward, please continue to pray for us, asking the Holy Spirit to guide us, to lead us to where He wants to take us. The Holy Spirit is definitely in the driver's seat, driving the bus, and where we go from here is an unknown, but I do know that it's going to be one remarkable and unforgettable ride.

Reflections from Fr. Robert Carlton: Saint Ignatius of Loyola

Recently – on July 31st – the Church marked the memorial of St. Ignatius of Loyola, who died on that day in Rome in 1556. St. Ignatius is undoubtedly one of the great figures in the history of the Church and especially in the spiritual history of the Church. Briefly, he was born in Spain in 1491 to nobility and, for the first thirty years of his life, he was attracted to a military life and the life



of the court. However, in 1521, during a battle at Pamplona, a cannonball destroyed his right leg and his military career was over. During his recovery from the surgery to try and save his leg, Ignatius found himself alone a lot of the time and with only two things to read: the Bible and the lives of the Saints. Throughout this long period, Ignatius found himself very gradually becoming more attracted to the lives of the Saints and what they stood for and grew disillusioned with the military and court life that he had pursued previously. One of the methods for prayer that he practiced in this period, and what eventually formed the basis of his spiritual life in the future, was simple meditation, or imaginatively placing yourself in the scene that is being presented so that you could, for example, see the manger in the stable at the birth of Jesus. This process that Ignatius went through here is also known as discernment, of which he came to be a master.

It was during the years after his conversion that Ignatius composed what became his great gift to the Church, which is his *Spiritual Exercises*. These *Exercises*, which were published for the first time in 1548, are a series of prayers, meditations and reflections that are organized into four thematic weeks and are designed to be done over a period of four weeks. My personal favorite of these meditations is the one "to make a good sound election." Two of the rules there instruct the retreatant to "consider as if I were at the point of death," how they would have wanted to make the decision and to act accordingly, and to "consider how I shall find myself on the Day of Judgment" and to act accordingly.

However, the goal of the whole *Exercises* is to get to know the person of Jesus and, in so doing, to really discern the will of God in their lives. Notably, the first rule for the meditation to make a sound decision is not to decide what would get a person the most money or fame, but rather to choose the thing that brings one closer to God. The retreat starts out with what is known as the "First Principle and Foundation," which states succinctly: "Man is created to praise, reverence and serve God our Lord, and by this means to save his soul." Ignatius goes on: "the other things on the face of the earth are created for man and that they may help him in prosecuting the end for which he is created. From this it follows that man is to use them as much as they help him on to his end, and ought to rid himself of them so far as they hinder him as to it." What follows this, if one were to make the Exercises, is a remarkable journey into the life of Jesus and those that walked with him and, in so doing, to get to know oneself better and, hence, be able to fully and accurately discern the path that God wants them to walk in life. Ignatian spirituality has spread all over the world and has helped many thousands of people, both Catholic and not, to live fuller and more satisfying lives. But, one cannot understand or know Ignatian spirituality without first understanding the Spiritual Exercises.



Gospel Meditation - Encourage a Deeper Understanding of Scripture



The lens through which we view life makes a difference. It also determines who we choose to learn from and what we allow to shape our thoughts and feelings. For many, life is simply what it appears to be, a given that either through evolution or some other means just came to be. There is no apparent rhyme or reason to things and things can be dissected and understood only in terms of what they empirically present. To the person using this lens, a tree is a tree and a flower is a flower. Their composition and existence can be understood only to the extent that

current human knowledge allows. Through this lens, what gives life purpose and meaning? This lens has an essentially unknown beginning and definite end. Once those are accepted, the middle becomes some kind of pursuit of happiness, with values and principles being things that are self-created and found acceptable.

But there is a Divine lens that also exists and deserves mention. It is found when one stumbles upon faith and begins to see things differently. This lens is of God and reveals a Divine Energy and Life that flows through and in all things. Faith then shows us that all that lives come from this one Source of Love. This is the only true lens that can give human beings the purpose and meaning they desperately need. From this perspective, all of life is much more than what is immediately apparent! It now tells and reveals a story about God's generous, creative, and unconditional love! The unfolding of the human story is the unfolding of God's story. What meaning our lives have when they are viewed as a part of God's love affair with humanity! We are indeed special.

The lens of our faith asks us to learn from Jesus Christ. Jesus, as the real Bread of Life, shows us our eternal destiny and completes and frames our lives. It is only in allowing ourselves to be taught by Jesus, that faith, hope, and love take on much greater importance. All the relationships in our lives are now structured and ordered using God's primary commandment of love. Jesus, then, is not just some man who lived at some point in history. Jesus is the incarnate Son of God who shows us the way, the truth, and the life. Using this lens changes things up a great deal. Looking at the creation that surrounds you and the special unique people you love, what is God trying to teach you about His love for you and the eternal life He wants you to have? ©LPi
