Reflections From Fr. Robert Carlton: Saint Francis Xavier

On December 3rd, the Church marked the memorial of one of the great Jesuit saints, Francis Xavier, who lived from 1506 through 1552 and who was held in such high regard by his contemporaries in the Church that he was originally scheduled to be canonized before Ignatius himself. He has long been considered perhaps the most effective missionary for the Church since St. Paul and was declared, along with Therese of Lisieux, the patron of missions in 1927 by Pope Pius XI. Xavier's early life was much like

that of Ignatius, in that Xavier was born to a family with noble connections and spent his early years primarily concerned with accumulating worldly glory, rather than doing things for Christ. By 1525, Xavier had gone to Paris to study at the University of Paris, a university where he was to ultimately spend the next eleven years studying. In 1529, Xavier was living with his friend Pierre Favre in Paris when Ignatius of Loyola also began living with them. Ignatius fairly quickly convinced Favre to become a priest but had less success with Xavier, only succeeding when Favre had left for an extended visit with his family allowing Ignatius more opportunities for one-on-one interactions with Xavier.

On August 15, 1534, Ignatius, Xavier and five others took private vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience to the Pope. This group of seven became the first members of the *Society of Jesus* or the *Jesuits*, which was officially formed in 1540 when Pope Paul III approved the formula that Ignatius had written up for a new religious order. In that same year, the King of Portugal requested that Ignatius send some Jesuit missionaries to the newly acquired Portuguese colonies in India. The story behind this is worth reflecting on as it shows the faith that Xavier had not only in God, but also in Ignatius and in the vows that he had taken. Ignatius had initially appointed two others, Nicholas Bobadilla and Simao Rodrigues, to go to India. However, only forty-eight hours before they were scheduled to depart, Bobadilla became very ill and was not able to go and with the limited number of ships leaving, this was going to mean that only Rodrigues or no one was going to go. Ignatius then asked Xavier to go in Bobadilla's place and, knowing that this likely was going to be a journey that he would not return from, Xavier accepted and left Rome on March 15, 1540, carrying only a few books. He would never come back to Rome or see Ignatius again.

Xavier traveled first to Lisbon and then departed for Goa in India in April of 1541. He would ultimately devote the rest of his life to working in the missions in Asia, principally in India, Japan, and areas off the coast of China. One of Xavier's great contributions to missionary work was his recognition of the importance of evangelizing in centers of power first and, as such, he would first try and convert the local rulers, thinking that this would cause that person's followers to become Catholic as well, rather than starting with the general population. Xavier's ultimate goal of reaching mainland China was not realized, as he died on December 3, 1552, while waiting for a boat that would take him and his companions to China. According to tradition, he converted more people to the faith than any one individual since St. Paul. - Fr. Robert

Immaculate Conception Parish Catholic High School Scholarship Fund

Immaculate Conception Parish would like to restart our Catholic High School Scholarship Fund which we started last year. We recognize the value and importance of a Catholic High School education and hope that this could potentially make a difference in the ability of our graduates to continue their Catholic education. All graduates from Immaculate Conception School or our IC Religious Education Program, who either will attend a Catholic High School next year or are currently attending Catholic High Schools, would be eligible to apply. Application materials and directions will be posted on our parish website **after March 1, 2022** with applications due by **May 1, 2022**. While

the amount and number of scholarships available will depend upon the amount of money raised, it is hoped that they would be a minimum of \$500, as they were last year. Also, while it is hoped that the scholarships could be renewed, funding initially is only guaranteed for one year. 
Advent Ignatian Spirituality Series - Tuesdays @ 7:00 P.M.



News... *Eighth Grade Religion Class with Mr. O'Donnell*

The focus of our textbook for 8th grade religion is about the development of the Church, from the events of Pentecost up until the present day. The main focus of the first four chapters of our text is the lives of St. Peter, St. Paul, the early martyrs, and the Communion of Saints.

We started this unit with the life of St. Peter and his imprisonment in Rome, after the Roman emperor Nero sought to find a way to stifle the development of the early Christian Movement. Though Nero himself was the one to set the fires in the city of Rome, he used the early Christians and their leaders as scapegoats for the fires, one of whom was Peter. In the account that we studied, Peter was aided by a young Christian woman who tended to the wounds inflicted on Peter while he was in prison. She, along with Peter, was instrumental in changing the heart of a Roman guard who previously had followed the orders of Nero but ultimately chose to defy and oppose him. There was a moment in our story when Peter faced Nero, shortly before his death, and said *"It is the truth that has set me free. Let it set you free."*

After this, we moved on to the story of St. Paul. We followed his progression from chief oppressor of the early Christian movement, when he was known as the Pharisee Saul, to his conversion experience on the road to Damascus, when he was knocked off his horse, blinded by light, and heard the voice of Jesus speaking to him. He heard Jesus' words, *"Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?"* This was followed by a complete reversal of his previous mission, as he transitioned from eliminating the Christians to proclaiming the Gospel despite great hardship and persecution. This change ultimately led to his beheading and death at the hands of Nero, years prior to the conversion of the Empire to the new Christian faith.

Finally, we have explored early martyrs of the growing Church. We began with the stoning of Stephen, who is considered the first Christian martyr, as he attempted to spread the message of Jesus. This event was a key experience in the life of Saul/Paul, prior to his conversion experience. In the account that we studied, Paul is tortured by these memories, and as he awakens from his dreams, he consoles himself with the thought *"Your Grace is sufficient."* Both Peter and Paul, along with most of the original apostles, were martyred for their efforts to spread the Gospel. These acts of sacrifice and heroism inspired our discussion of the Communion of Saints. Here we find support of those people, both famous and not, who have contributed to the life and growth of the Church.




