In Preparation for Christmas

Last weekend, I preached at every Mass about Evangelization. I preached to everyone because it needs to be a central value and activity of all of us at our parish.

To recap: Evangelization has its source in God. Normally, we think of ourselves in terms of what we do. We choose, we work hard, and we accomplish many things—people recognize who we are by what we do.



Faith must be the same, right? But faith turns things on its head. Our faith, and one of the central messages of Christmas, is that it is not us. God comes to us out of His bountiful, generous love. He gives us life and new life in Christ.

Evangelization is rooted in this. The word "evangelization" comes from the Greek word for Gospel, or Good News. I ask each one of you to engage in evangelization, which takes part in two ways:

First, it is an inward journey. No one can force you to love or to be thankful, you must want those things in your own heart. We believe that by looking inwards, we can see the God who made you in His image and likeness. Out of His love, you received life. As you look inwardly at yourself, you will also see your uniqueness, gifts, and talents. You will see God, and the you that God loves.

From that inward journey, another takes place outwardly. The core of our faith is God creating and loving generously. We are called then to love generously too. We must look inwardly and ask, "how can I be generous with who I am?"

This is the foundation of all things: love God with all your heart, mind, and soul, and love your neighbor as yourself. This is the inward and outward journey of evangelization as well.

We would like all our parishioners to pray for Evangelization at our parish, that we all may become a more loving and generous people. Many good things come from this starting point.



Welcome to 3 Year Old Preschool!

Room 19 is filled with the excitement of learning and growing each day. For 3 year olds, this is their first school experience and they are now a part of our fantastic IC community.

Having a structured day with a consistent routine is the key to success for these little ones. The children enjoy their daily activities and are quick to point out if we stray from the norm.



We begin each day with our morning prayer. We recite the Pledge of Allegiance, dress Froggy for the weather, and count the monthly calendar. The children are improving their counting skills and love picking out their favorite weather appropriate clothes for Froggy.

Learning through play is the most important part of our school day. Whether the children are playing at the Block Center, Dramatic Play Center, Sensory Center, or Art Center, they are learning basic academic skills that reinforce math, literacy, social studies, and science. Through play they learn to be a good friend, share, take turns, raise a quiet hand, solve conflicts, and so much more.



Every week our schedule includes a Theme and a Letter. This week we introduced the "Letter K". The children learned to recognize the letter, listen for the sound, and even did some skywriting to reinforce how the letter K is formed. They are preparing to be brilliant, future readers.

The theme for our week was "Outer Space". How fun it is to discover what is way above the clouds! Our preschool children enjoyed learning about the sun, moon, stars, and all the planets that orbit the sun. They loved pretending to be astronauts that travel to space in their amazing rocket ships! They learned to count down from 10 and then . . . BLAST OFF!









As you can see, our preschool children are busy learning and growing each day. They are developing friendships that will last a lifetime. They love their school and are excited to be a part of IC. We are fortunate and blessed to have these little ones join our community and we welcome their families to IC as well.






Pope Tweet of the Week...

Gospel Meditation - Encourage a Deeper Understanding of Scripture



In Blaise Pascal's work, Pensees, he says: "What else does this craving, and this helplessness, proclaim but that there was once in man a true happiness, of which all that now remains is the empty print and trace? This he tries in vain to fill with everything around him, seeking in things that are not there the help he cannot find in those that are, though none can help, since this infinite abyss can be filled only with an infinite and immutable object; in other words by God himself."

We have a difficult time accepting that fulfillment and happiness are not achieved by our own merits but through a relationship with God. We are hardwired for this relationship and it is in our DNA. The simple fact is that we come from God and are designed to return to God. If our beginning and our end define who we are, why would we not want to seek the One who can truly satisfy? The world does not realize that it is waiting. It is waiting for the birth of God in time, within one's soul and in eternity. We get so confused by seeking other momentary satisfactions that we misinterpret the hunger within. We crave God.

The union of God and humanity, revealed in Jesus Christ, is precisely what sets us on a straight path, orders our relationships, establishes proper focus and goals and tells us whose kingdom we really are meant to serve. We are so lost. God is with us. The prophet Nathan told this to King David, the angel said this to Mary and the birth of Christ brings this Good News to us. We do not need to be busily looking for more things but must learn to find contentment and blessing in the One Presence. This is the beautiful simple message of Advent!

If you are feeling unsettled, anxious, angry, disgruntled, disconnected, unhappy, worried, fearful, off center, becoming overly self-indulgent, unable to spend time alone and without distraction, then there's a good chance you are lost. Now is the time to allow God to find you! Ponder the holy simplicity of Mary's call to be the Mother of God. "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word." When we are helpless and at home with our emptiness, God will fill us. Our Savior has come. ©LPi

Let us be grateful beyond measure for this gift above all gifts, let us continue on our journey, and let our lives give testimony to the one who leads us.


