# A Blessed Christmas To Everyone

As we close out this year of 2020, so much has changed in our world. The world is always changing around us, but few years have affected us as a people the way 2020 has. Christmas always comes at a good time, but the *message* of Christmas is possibly even more appropriate for us now.



Christmas celebrates a sort of inauguration of God's Kingdom. The King has come to us. "God has visited His people." In that Kingdom, sin and death no longer have power over us, and darkness will never rule over us as it had before. Jesus, in humility and poverty, becomes our King—one of many paradoxes expressed in the person of Jesus.

This year has had its own paradoxes. Technology, which we have claimed earlier in time to have isolated us, has now become the vehicle of keeping us together. Keeping our distance is our way of showing love, and so on.

Life is contradiction and life is paradox, which is a theme constant in the Old Testament. It finds itself in the person of Jesus. Within that paradox, however, is the process of stripping away the unimportant and unessential. Jesus came as a helpless child with nothing to His name, after all. All Jesus was, in fact, was love. The unmerited, undeserved, and much-needed gift of the Supreme God which was sent to us out of an abundance of love.

This love that God sends to us is paradoxical, strange, and maybe even illogical—at least to those who think they know better. It is perfect generosity and perfect justice.

In all of this, the message of Christmas is:

First: God has come to us out of love to save us.

*Second*: His life breaks the power of death. His generosity breaks the power of selfishness.

*Third*: He becomes like us in all ways so that we can become like God in all ways.

Christmas reveals to us that life with God is possible. Through Him, we can love more truly. I think this is the sort of message that we need to emphasize this Christmas. Not gifts, not lights, not music and movies, but that God has set for us an example of genuine, humble love.

I want to wish all of you a blessed Christmas, where I hope God and His love are the centerpiece in each of your homes. On behalf of all of our staff here at the parish and school, we are incredibly grateful for your support of all kinds this past year. May 2021 bring us blessings of God's peace.





# Solemnity of Mary, Holy Mother of God



# Gospel Meditation - Encourage a Deeper Understanding of Scripture



Tragedy and disappointment are inevitable. What sees you through this? There will be challenges, changes, unexpected circumstances, interrupted plans, hurts, and injustices experienced by every human being at some point in their lives. We will be asked to adjust our plans, change course, and even encounter suffering and death. Where do we learn all of the lessons we need to live life well? Some of them we learn along the way but much of what we bring to life, positive and negative, comes from our early beginnings, our families. This is our early world and provides the blueprint for how we see the bigger, more inclusive world, which unfolds before us.

Our families of origin can be sources of grace, heartache or a combination of both. Families are intended to be pivotal in providing us with proper social structure and understanding, a support system, lessons about relationships and communication, and the unconditional acceptance and love we so desperately crave. They can also determine whether we have an accessible and healthy relationship with God. Many of life's challenges can literally bring us to our knees and require that we possess a strength of character that resides well beyond the superficialities of our world. At some point we will all need three coping gifts that can be given to us only by God: faith, hope, and love. Our families help us learn that we are not the ones responsible for their creation, but God!

Our experience of early family life colors all of our relationships and what we expect to achieve from life in general. Resolving conflicts, dealing with difficulty and suffering, celebrating accomplishments, prioritizing our needs, listening to God's call, understanding relationships, understanding disappointment, learning about the virtues and living a centered focused life are all lessons our families either succeed in teaching or do not. To succeed, as God has designed and ordered our world, is to discover his presence and then trust that Presence. The Holy Family can teach even the most dysfunctional family how to best use God's gifts of faith, hope, and love to find him and do his will. Their simple humble example is always before us, showing us the way. Jesus, Mary and Joseph, pray for us!
