#### A New Season of Alpha is Beginning at IC in 2021



In our readings to start the season of Advent, Jesus commands us to be watchful and awake. Being 'awake' has many meanings, but in the context of faith it means an alertness and readiness to receive God's word in your heart. For "you know what hour it is, how it is full time now for you to wake from sleep" (Romans 13:11).

Alpha is a program that allows people to deepen their faith by working together with fellow seekers. They may be disciples, onlookers, and the curious. Jesus came to all such people, and sent his disciples to these same people because all people can learn from the one we call Teacher. While its format is simple, it draws on one of the most powerful principles of our faith, *"Where two or three are gathered in my name, there I am in the midst of them"* (Mt 18:20). Being together in faith and discussing how it fits into our lives is a benefit to anyone and to everyone.

I encourage you this Advent to reflect on the state of your faith and consider participating in this program either at the beginning of 2021 or later in the year – we will offer two sessions every year. Our Alpha team leaders will be at our Masses in the coming weeks to answer your questions and to tell you more about why Alpha might be of interest to you.

"The Alpha experience was not what I expected. I thought I was going to be "taught" or "preached to" before we started. Instead, we "experienced" a personal invitation to become closer to Christ, and to learn how to invite the Holy Spirit into our lives. There is something wonderful about being able to pray for someone, with that person, and to have others pray for you. There is a strength and comfort in small group prayer.

I never felt pressured to "feel" a certain way. We all completed ALPHA having experienced different things, and that is fine! There is no right or wrong, no levels of religiosity to attain. It is a personal journey. Not a class. Not "Sunday School." I can't stress that enough. There is no grade. There is no pressure. It's a personal experience."

## Immaculate Conception Becomes Hearing Accessible



Here at IC, we want to make sure that everyone is able to easily understand the readings, sermon, and song lyrics, regardless of hearing status. We are excited to now offer assistive listening devices for anyone who has difficulty hearing. These devices stream the church sound system directly to the device user's ear. This service is important because churches are some of the most difficult listening environments for people with hearing loss. The echo created as a result of the high ceilings and reflective windows makes it difficult to distinguish what is being said. Assistive listening devices eliminate the problems created by the echo and vastly improve the listening experience.

## Smartphone App Offered:

• Williams Sound App: If your hearing aids or cochlear implants have Bluetooth capability, download the Williams Sound App to your Iphone or Android smartphone. This app allows you to stream the church sound system directly to your hearing aids, cochlear implants, or headphones via Bluetooth.

Assistive Listening Devices Available for Checkout from Ushers:

1. Telecoil Neckloop: This device works as a transmitter, collecting the church's sound signal and sending it directly to the user's hearing aids or cochlear implants. This is the ideal option for a hearing aid or cochlear implant user who does not have a smartphone that is connected to their devices. In order for this Telecoil Neckloop to work, the hearing aids or cochlear implants must be in a "telecoil program." If you are unsure if your device has this program, ask your audiologist.

2. Wireless Receiver: This device is best for someone who would like to hear better, but does not have their own set of hearing aids or cochlear implants. It also works as a transmitter, collecting the church's sound signal and sending it directly to the user's ears via headphones. You can use the headphones provided by the church or bring your own set of headphones and connect them to the device.

#### Assistive Listening Device Checkout Procedure:

If you would like to check out an assistive listening device, please ask one of the church ushers. They will request that you give a driver's license or credit card when you check out the device. Your card will be given back to you upon return of the device after Mass.

If you need any assistance setting up the smartphone app or assistive listening devices, feel free to ask me before our 8:30 A.M. or 10:30 A.M. Sunday Masses. I am an audiology student and love to help people hear better.

## Gospel Meditation - Encourage a Deeper Understanding of Scripture



People knew over a year in advance that the Pope was coming for a visit to America and the preparations began. Security, space limitations and requirements, protocols, crowd management, itineraries, invitations, regulations, and so much more was necessary to pull this event off effectively. It's not every day that we get a visit from such a prominent dignitary. Thought, effort, meticulous attention to detail and vision all are necessary to make this thing work. After all, he can't just show up in the ordinary and normal daily routines of life and catch people unprepared! Tickets have to be purchased, buses rented, hotel rooms reserved, and travel arrangements made

early because it will be impossible to see him if we wait too long!

We do this kind of preparing not only for prominent religious figures but for political dignitaries, notable sports figures, people of fame, and even actors. If an individual intrigues us, we are going to want to do all we have to do to get a "good seat" in the house. Does Jesus Christ captivate this much of our attention? We are asked to prepare the way of the Lord and to do so not with frantic frenzy but patient enthusiasm. We do not have to stand on a street corner making profound announcements about God's coming or become overly zealous in our embrace of the Good News. Our task is quieter, more interior, captivating, and consuming. We are asked to change. We have to conduct our lives with holy devotion.

Is the cost of that ticket too much for you? Don't you want the "best seat" in the house? You don't want to miss Our Lord's arrival when he comes, do you? After all, if he comes while you are going about your daily routines without you even knowing, he may catch you off guard. Or, he may come in disguise looking like a beggar, a prisoner, migrant, refugee, or someone who is lost. Would you be ready to recognize him then? Preparing for the coming of Christ requires a change of mind, heart, and behavior. It is not adequate to simply do the things we always do. We want our lives to speak of the exciting news of Christ's coming and the joy that the Gospel brings. It has to do with our demeanor, values, priorities, choices, and how we structure daily routines. Of course, it involves sacrifice. All anticipations do! Are you excited, captivated, enthusiastic, and sitting on the edge of your seat eager to celebrate his coming among us at Christmas, and waiting for him to come again? If not, why not? ©LPi
