

# Reflections From Fr. Robert Carlton: Ignatian Contemplation

One of St. Ignatius' great gifts to the Church was his focus on and development of contemplative prayer. This is a form of prayer which has, as a goal, trying to live fully in union with God so that everything you do is reflective of God's presence. St. Paul spoke to this in the First Letter to the Thessalonians where he instructed his audience to "rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." Clearly, Paul, by telling people to pray without ceasing does not mean that they should go around reciting the Our Father all day. Rather, contemplation in the Ignatian sense means to take a "long loving look at God" and, in so doing, recognize all the gifts that God has given and to live your life, all your life, with a recognition of that fact. St. Francis of Assisi is responsible for starting this kind of prayer by encouraging people to pray with the Christmas creche several centuries before Ignatius, but this was popularized by Ignatius and the Jesuits.



Ignatian contemplation, then, is specifically designed to inspire you to use your imagination to "place" yourself in a scene from Scripture, or with Jesus, Mary or God, and the prayer starts off by asking you to "compose the place," which means to imaginatively be specific about the practicalities of the place where the scene is happening. What is the weather? Who is there? What exactly are they doing? What are some of the bigger picture events that are taking place at the same time? Through the story, God meets and interacts with each listener personally and differently, and those points of interaction are the points where prayer happens. The main challenge of this form of prayer, though, is to let God be in control and to direct you to where He wants you to go to, and not only where you think you ought to be going towards.

In an Ignatian contemplation, the story that one is considering should be read four times. At the end of the fourth reading, there should be a period of fifteen to twenty minutes of silent reflection. In the first reading, the individual should try to focus on the big picture items of the story: where and under what circumstances does the story take place? Who is there? What are the plot lines of the story? If it is a story about Jesus, what exactly is he doing in that story? After reading the story through slowly, one should pause for two to three minutes at the end. Then, for the second reading, one should start moving deeper into some of the details of the story: who are the players in this story? Who are the major ones and who are the minor ones? What exactly are they doing? How do they interact with each other? Do they have a cordial relationship or is this one that is fraught with tension? What time of the day does this story take place and what is the mood that accompanies it? After pausing for two to three minutes, then move into the third reading. By this point, one should really be into the details of the story and be able to genuinely feel as if you are present in the place. The questions to contemplate with this reading could be: who or what are you specifically in the story? Maybe, for example, in the story of the Road to Emmaus, you are a rock next to where Jesus meets the two disciples. What are you doing, thinking, or feeling or who is with you if you are an inanimate object? What are the sounds and smells of the location? What are the specific emotions that you notice going on here? After pausing for two to three more minutes, read the story for a fourth time. By this reading, the story should be able to unfold with you as a participant in the story. Try this practice with any of the stories in the Scriptures and see what God is trying to tell you through them.





Saint of The Week - Examples of Our Faith: Saint Conrad of Piacenza (February 19th)

The history of St. Conrad of Piacenza is quite fascinating. A member of one of the most noble families of Piacenza, he was known for his utmost honesty. One day while out hunting with friends, he thought he saw some game in an area of brush and ordered his attendants to set fire to the brush in order to scare it out of hiding. Unfortunately, the dry brush quickly ignited, and fire started to spread. Soon, the surrounding area was engulfed in flames.

Unfortunately, a known arsonist happened to be in the same area as the fire. This man was later imprisoned, tried, and condemned to death for the damage. But on his way to his execution, St. Conrad of Piacenza, full of guilt, stopped the proceedings and confessed to the fire. To make restitution for the damages, Conrad had to sell all his belongings, which reduced him to poverty. Soon after, he decided to retire to a hermitage, where he became a hermit of the Third Order of St. Francis, and his wife entered the Order of Poor Clares. ©LPi

# Gospel Meditation - Encourage a Deeper Understanding of Scripture



What has been the most difficult challenge you faced in your life? Many difficult human experiences can "turn up the heat" in our lives, causing us to question the why of things or even fall into despair. Some people just somewhat passively accept what life brings, even death, and chalk difficult experiences up to happening "because they do." They seemingly endure and move on. Taking life at face value, there really is no ultimate meaning to things. It's easier to ignore that inner prompting calling us to understand why. It's there whether we admit it or not. To question

or not to question — that is the question! People sometimes give up the God search because it causes too many questions. Once we open the door to the possibility of God's existence, then all of the awkward, challenging, and tragic pieces of life have to find their place.

It gets messy. But the search is so important to living. We can easily dry up and become arid, abandoning any hope for purpose and meaning because it's too difficult and non-rational at times. In searching for answers to the how and why of life, human beings also embark on a search for God. When one finally stumbles upon the real living tangible presence of God, then that discovery allows life's ironies and tensions to be held side by side with the all-encompassing totally unconditional, unmerited love of God! Then when life's heat gets turned up, difficulties and challenges abound, dryness and heartache become the norm, the soul remains in joyful repose. There is no fear.

The beatitudes celebrate life's ironies and tensions, holding them all together in the Kingdom of God. Poverty, hunger, weeping, being insulted and hated are not things we would normally associate with being God's friends. But they are! In fact, those who experience these uncomfortable realities of life are actually better off than those who do not. This is what makes Jesus' message so intriguing! Don't give up questioning. Questioning the apparent inequities and polarities of human experience will certainly challenge one's faith. But it's the only way to deepen it. ©LPi
