

This Lenten Season @ IC

Lent is a special time of year. While it is considered "penitential," this is not a dirty word in our faith. Penitence is, by definition, a show of sorrow in some way for our sins. The Catholic, however, does not end in sorrow, but rather joy. We are sorry for our sins, because we have damaged our relationship with Him who loves us immensely. We show sorrow for our sins, because we have hurt each other whom we are called to love.



Penitence is an act of restoration. We recognize the good we have lost or harmed, and we make efforts to reconcile it. This is always a good thing and a holy pursuit.

The Lenten season is built to recalibrate our faith. Through fasting, prayer, and almsgiving, we are urged to be more generous with God.

To that effect, the following are some of the things that we are doing during Lent and would ask you to participate in:

1) Mass

Mass happens year-round, obviously. But if you are looking for a way to grow in faith, consider watching our Mass daily. Seriously consider attending or watching (as you are able) every Sunday. No one grows in faith without dedication and sacrifice. The Mass is the bedrock of a mature faith.

2) Reconciliation

The sacrament is so very important to the life of a Christian. We have offered the sacrament to people every 1st and 3rd Tuesday from 6:00 to 7:00 P.M. *We will experiment on the first weekend of Lent, Sunday, February 21st, by offering the sacrament between our 8:30 A.M. and 10:30 A.M. Masses*. Please take advantage of this opportunity since we will not be having a Reconciliation service proper. If successful, we will do it more often.


3) Vespers

Vespers returns in-person and will now also be available online! Vespers is one of five principle times of prayer in the whole Catholic Church. Meditative by nature, it is sung Scripture. No preaching or anything cumbersome. Simply 20-25 minutes of beautiful music in praise of God. In a time where "peace" is all too uncommon, grow in prayer by joining us every Wednesday during Lent at 7:00 P.M. beginning on February 24th and continuing on March 3rd, March 10th, March 17th, concluding on March 24th.

4) Online Reflections and Education

Consider reading Fr. Robert's brief and insightful reflections which he writes nearly daily. They are accessible on our Facebook page. Likewise, I also plan to make videos centered around the Lenten season. I have bought some new equipment for recording, so expect new content soon.

We hope you have a blessed Lent. Let us walk together in confidence and faith, Fr. Matt




Ash Wednesday Mass Schedule







Gospel Meditation - Encourage a Deeper Understanding of Scripture



The Church, as a voice of the Gospel, proclaims the sacredness of all human life. Everyone created by God is fashioned in God's image and has Divine DNA at the center of their soul. God never leaves what God creates but always remains intimately bound to what he has given form. Everyone has a place and because they have received the gift of Divine Blessing, nobody deserves to feel inferior, unworthy, unwanted, unclean or marginalized. Even the most broken of souls has a place. We, the Body of Christ, have the privilege and responsibility to give voice to the voiceless. The cries of the little one in his or her mother's womb are just as sacred as the cries of one who is

homeless and hungry. The migrant deserves our attention as much as the forgotten elderly and even the prisoner, with a heart hardened by anger and resentment, deserves respect and dignity.

The Gospel of Life is often hard to swallow, and we would rather keep those we consider unclean, different or unfixable in a place by themselves. It is hard to see them with us, but they deserve to be. There is far too much violence in this world and the result of that violence is the assault on human life. Many are forced to leave the place they call home in search of safer ground, finding few if any along the way who will help them. How different today's Gospel story would be if Jesus gave in to what was politically correct at that time. The leper would have been turned away and a soul, already beaten down by disease and fear, would have experienced an even deeper wound. Jesus wouldn't have captured much attention from anyone, nor would he have mirrored the Father's compassion and love.

Where do we stand with all of this? Do we at least understand that God's vision is often in conflict with the vision put forth in our world and even the one we advance ourselves? There is no doubt that it is incredibly challenging to find a place for everyone at the table. This challenge is compounded when the systems of operation and structure that are so ingrained in us affirm power and privilege rather than inclusivity and justice. Everything really goes askew when the powerful begin to control who is entitled to wholeness and inclusion, and greed becomes a driving force. Prejudice and entitlement raise their ugly heads and we find ourselves with quite a mess. It's time to admit that things have been a mess for a very long time. The mess needs to be healed, not by erasing it but by allowing God to touch it and make it whole. We need to bring God back to the center of life where God belongs. There are no easy solutions to the world's dilemmas. But, knowing that wholeness, healing, and dignity are worthy pursuits, we can more confidently labor to achieve God's vision.

The Unfailing Goodness of God...

I have always wondered why Jesus told the cleansed leper not to publicize how he had been healed by the Son of God. It's not that I can't understand why Jesus would want to keep the matter quiet — after all, he knew that as soon as people heard, he would be mobbed with requests for healings, and his movements restricted.

What gets me is the fact that Jesus simply must have realized the leper would not listen to him. Why give someone a command you know they will ignore? It's a complicated question, and when I reflect on it, I can't help but connect it to another equally complicated question: why does God, all-good and all-knowing, allow bad things to happen?



Yes, God is all-good and all-knowing. So when He gives us free will, He knows what we will do with it. However, He is also all-powerful. He can and will bring good from any situation, any tragedy, or even any instance where someone ignores Him.

Was it a sin for this leper to do other than what Jesus had said? That's a heavy question for a Sunday morning! But it's plain to see that, even though this man ignored Jesus' command, God still used his actions. How many were brought to Christ because of the news spread by this leper!
