

Reflections from Fr. Robert Carlton: Who specifically is Jesus in the Gospel of Luke?

This week in the summer Scripture series, we examined the figure of Jesus in the Gospel of Luke and the overall themes that the author of that Gospel was trying to present. The author of Luke was traditionally a physician, which would mean that he was someone who was well-versed in the literary and scientific culture of the day. The part about Luke being a physician has largely been discounted in recent



decades, but the text clearly indicates that Luke was an intelligent and educated individual and the quality of the grammar and the language used in his Gospel is far more sophisticated than what Mark used in his Gospel. This background of Luke personally is something that has a decided impact on what he has produced. For example, Jesus is someone that is presented as a very educated and intellectual figure. Luke's is the only Gospel that presents the story of Jesus in the temple at the age of twelve: "When the festival was ended and they started to return, the boy Jesus stayed behind in Jerusalem but his parents did not know it... After three days they found him in the temple, sitting among the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions. And all who heard him were amazed at his understanding and his answers." Jesus being so interested in scripture at such a young age would have marked him out clearly as a prodigy. Also, when Jesus returns to his hometown of Nazareth after his public ministry has begun, "he went to the synagogue on the sabbath day...He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written..." The fact that Jesus was able to manipulate a scroll and find a specific place in it indicates a scholarly bent for him, which, not coincidentally, makes him a lot like Luke himself.

Not insignificantly, as well, the whole story that Luke was writing here is a two volume work, which begins with the birth of John the Baptist: "Do not be afraid, Zechariah, for your prayer has been heard. Your wife Elizabeth will bear you a son and you will name him John." The story ends, though, not with the Resurrection but continues in the Acts of the Apostles and concludes when Paul has reached Rome: "He [Paul] lived there [Rome] two whole years at his own expense and welcomed all who came to him, proclaiming the kingdom of God and teaching about the Lord Jesus Christ with all boldness and without hindrance." Luke, then, is concerned with a larger overall picture than Matthew or Mark and is really trying to situate the story of the life of Jesus into the story of the movement of the faith from its start in Israel to Rome, which, at the time, was the center of the world. As a result, Luke is going to be very concerned with presenting the story of how Christians can be good citizens of the Roman Empire. If the faith is going to spread to Rome, then it needs to be something that can be acceptable to the Roman authorities and Luke would be mindful of the fact that Jesus, the founder of the faith, had been executed as a political criminal and Christians had been associated with the destruction of Jerusalem. Luke, then, would want to show Jesus as someone who taught things that would have been compatible with being a good citizen of the Roman Empire. The Jesus in Luke, as a result, is someone who is interested in teaching compassion and in establishing an inclusive mission and seeking out those who have been lost and fallen away and restore them to unity with God. A main example of this is the parable of the Lost Sheep in Luke: "Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep that was lost. Just so, I tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who need no repentance." There is, of course, much more to Jesus in the Gospel of Luke but the picture presented is a fascinating one, which is firmly based in the person of Luke and the history in which the author was operating.







Gospel Meditation - Encourage a Deeper Understanding of Scripture



Maybe the work is best left to the professionals. That's how many people view the preaching of the Gospel. That's the stuff priests, religious, deacons, lay ministers, and other professional Church people do. It has little to do with me. Well, that's not really true. The fact of the matter is that preaching the Gospel has everything to do with you, with all of us who are baptized members of the Body of Christ. Nobody gets off the hook from that job. The question is, however, how do we do it? Well, there's a safe way, which many choose, to preach the Gospel — and the risky way. The safe way pretty much keeps the Gospel in church and around like-minded people. I say my prayers, go to Mass, contribute to the food

pantry, tithe, and attend Bible Study. That pretty much covers the bases, right? Wrong.

The risky way is the more challenging way and for many, the "road less traveled." Imagine those first disciples going out and into people's homes. They must have had some amazing conversations with folks about God's kingdom, changing their hearts, forgiving sins, and looking at the world differently. They must have met people who were hurting, exiled from their communities, neglected, lost, or living self-insulated lives in a society that served the rich and neglected the poor. While there were many who welcomed what they had to say and the conversations they had, there were others who no doubt rejected them and literally tossed them out on their ears! The Gospel, while being a message of joy and hope, is not always received well by those who are very comfortable keeping things as they are.

The risky way involves example and conversation. We have to take the Gospel from church and carry it with us wherever we go. What kinds of conversations do we have with others? We interact with those closest to us, in our work, social circles, institutions, corporations, in politics, and beyond. Our conversations with others reveal a great deal about how we see things and what we consider important. If we are really interested in seeing God's vision for the world succeed, then we will talk about it. It will become a part of our everyday conversation and find its way into our interactions with others. How will we preserve the dignity of human life and encourage others to have a relationship with God? We must be the example, live value centered, virtuous lives, stand against injustice, combating racism, and learn ways to resolve conflicts without violence.

If we are going to succeed going forward, we have to find a way to bring our prayer centered lives into the marketplace. Our conversations have to change. Not everyone wants to hear what the Gospel has to say. That's a risk God asks us to take. ©LPi
