#### Fr. Robert Carlton rejoins IC as our newly appointed Associate Pastor...

We are truly pleased to announce that **Fr. Robert Carlton** has been assigned by Cardinal Cupich to serve IC as our new **Associate Pastor**, effective as of **Saturday**, **July 18th**! As you may recall, Fr. Robert spent his pastoral year with us during his time as a transitional Deacon (prior to his Ordination to the Priesthood on May 18th of last year.) He celebrated his first Mass as an ordained priest at our parish prior to joining the staff at St. John Brebeuf, where he has faithfully served their community for the past year. During that time, we were also blessed to have him maintain an active presence at IC, frequently assisting us with our 6:00 P.M. evening Mass on Sundays as well as our School Assembly Masses on Wednesdays at 8:30 A.M., so it is with grateful hearts that we look forward to welcoming him back into our parish family as a full-time member of our pastoral staff and continuing our ongoing collaboration with him. Please keep Fr. Robert in your prayers as he transitions into his new role at our parish in the days ahead.

#### Dear IC Parishioners,

It is with great sadness that I publish the following statement from the Diocese of St. Paul and Minneapolis (courtesy of **Tim O'Malley, Director of Ministerial Standards and Safe Environment**):

"As stated in a June 14, 2020 response to Catholic News Agency, in 2018 the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis received two reports from another diocese that David Haas acted inappropriately with two adult women at an event in another state. Both women complained that Haas' conduct made them feel uncomfortable. The Archdiocese had received an earlier complaint, in 1987, that Haas

had made unwanted sexual advances toward a young adult woman. In each instance, Haas denied that he engaged in inappropriate conduct. After receiving the 2018 complaint, the Archdiocese informed Haas that it would not provide a letter of recommendation that Haas had requested. Furthermore, we informed Haas that he was not allowed to provide services at Catholic institutions in the Archdiocese without disclosure of these complaints. Unless we receive other information, we will continue this course of action.

The Haas matter illustrates the challenges of responding to allegations of inappropriate behavior by lay persons who work with Catholic groups, especially when they are self-employed. We are committed to supporting anyone who has been harmed by persons of influence, prominence or power in our communities. At the same time, we recognize the importance of having a fair and appropriate forum that provides due process for those who have been accused.

However, the complaints about Haas are particularly concerning since they involve offenses against the dignity of the human person and are alleged to have occurred at Catholic events. We are committed to safe environments for all. We offer our support for those who have been harmed to come forward."

As of this bulletin, at least two of the major Catholic publishing companies have severed their professional relationships with Mr. Haas. After consulting with our Pastor Fr. Matt, we mutually concluded that it was appropriate to "retire" the music of Mr. Haas at IC. What does that mean exactly? Simply put, we will not perform his music at any parish event. Familiar songs such as *Blest Are they, We Are Called, You Are Mine,* etc. will no longer be a part of our musical canon going forward.


Having met Mr. Haas, as well as having many friends who have worked with him professionally, makes this decision difficult, but necessary. Should these allegations be found false, and the Diocese in which he resides restores his ability to receive a recommendation, we will revisit the matter.

# Live the Liturgy – Inspiration for the Week

Grace and sin are found together. As much as our hearts long for union with God, there is always that part of us that resists. As much as I wholeheartedly believe in God, there is a dimension of disbelief with which I also wrestle. Even though we may seek purity and integrity in all of our thoughts, words, and deeds, there is also the path toward weakness and sin that we find ourselves traversing. 

#### Gospel Meditation - Encourage a Deeper Understanding of Scripture



Grace and sin, belief and unbelief, good and evil all exist together. While we wrestle with these two dimensions of reality inwardly, they are also witnessed in the actions and words of others. Many, all too often, beat themselves up because of their sin. We are also all too quick to pass judgment on others whom we perceive to be in error and walking down a wrong path. God does not make rash judgments, nor should we. Patience is the order of the day as is an understanding that God is ultimately the caller of the shots.

Our faith tells us that while God allows the wheat and the weeds to coexist, the wheat will always triumph. As long as we can cultivate even a little faith and a small measure of desire for God, He can produce abundant blessings and good things. Even when the weeds seem to have triumphed, there still may be a small measure of faith remaining that can be cultivated and grown. It doesn't take much! Unless a person totally allows the weeds to reign, there is always to be found at least a small measure of faith, good, light, and love. With even this small portion, God can produce abundant growth.

Admittedly, it is easy to give into the weeds, and they grow very quickly. Any gardener knows this to be true. Sometimes, the weeds even seem more attractive and vibrant. Dealing with weeds can quickly become a losing battle, and they can look healthier and grow faster than the very plants we are trying to protect. It's easy to give into them and let them win. While God will deal with all things in due time, we are responsible for keeping things in check in the short term. It is our task to keep our eyes fixed on God's presence and mercy. We are asked to avoid judgment. And, it is not our responsibility to deal with the weeds in someone else's garden, only our own. One garden is enough responsibility for anyone.

Weeds have power. We have to realize this. While they can appear attractive and healthy, they can quickly choke us off from God's presence. Our task is one of maintenance and cultivating a desire for God. Even the smallest kernel of faith can grow into something wonderful. In God's time, the eternal harvest will come, and we will no longer have to worry about the weeds. ©LPi

#### Everyday Stewardship – Recognize God in your Ordinary Moments

#### Do What Needs to Be Done...

A friend recently confided in me that although he prayed frequently each day and was involved heavily in his parish, he did not sense much fruit coming from it all and was left feeling unsatisfied. I assured him he was not alone. I told him of a deceased pastor of mine who had spoken frequently about being in this type of situation. Even as a priest, he knew all too well of how we can feel like we are simply going through the motions. It is precisely at those times that continuing to pray and practicing good stewardship is most important, because it would be easier to simply take a break and risk never coming back. He liked to say, "Do the drill," meaning just do what needs to be done.

We are all called to be mature disciples who answer the call of Jesus Christ regardless of the cost. We cannot choose when and where the call will come. We cannot schedule our
