The Person Of Jesus In The Gospel Of John (Recap of Scripture Series 4 of 5)

John's Gospel can be broken down into a few main sections: 1. Prologue, 2. Signs, 3. Bread of Life Discourse (Chapter 6), 4. Rejection, 5. Light & Darkness, and 6. True Disciples (Chapters 13 – 21)

The core element of John's Gospel, as the "disciple whom Jesus loved," is love itself. Jesus is called the "Word of God." This word, Logos in Greek, has been defined as reason, account, and argument in philosophical translations. John's purpose, however, is different.

We communicate through words, but we all know the difference between conversations with a stranger and with a loved one – and everyone in between. We speak with words and their direct meaning, but also with connotations, euphemisms, poetry, vagaries, art, emotion, history, and nuance. Language contains so much more than merely the word itself.

Jesus is no mere Word. He is the love that the Father communicates to the world. Jesus is the revelation of the Father, the "light in darkness." John's Gospel reminds us frequently that seeking to understand who Jesus is, means loving the person Jesus Christ. The Gospel is replete with examples of others accepting and rejecting Him.

Chapter 6 is a perfect example of the progression of our relationship:

Multitudes \Rightarrow People \Rightarrow Followers \Rightarrow Disciples \Rightarrow Apostles

The end of the 6th Chapter reveals that "many returned to their former way of life; they no longer followed him."

John forces us to ask the question, "What are you looking for in Jesus?" If you seek to only be satisfied, to 'get something out of your relationship with Jesus, you will leave empty-handed, dejected. Jesus provides comfort and satisfaction, but only in the context of a true, reciprocal love – not in a contract or a quid pro quo relationship.

The theme of rejection is prevalent in Scripture, too. The first sin, after all, is the rejection of God and blaming another for our own faults. The middle chapters of John show many of society's outcasts who are rejected because of deformity, illness, choices, and ways of life. Jesus does not reject them: he heals, forgives, guides, and encourages - to each he says, "Go, and sin no more."

But those who reject Jesus, exercise their power in order to dominate. They respond to the challenges of Jesus with violence, not humility. And this is the primary source of darkness spoken of in John's Gospel. Darkness is the corruption of creation and the rejection of God. We are all born in darkness and susceptible to it. Jesus, as light, draws us from that darkness.

To a true disciple, John reminds us that God chooses us first. He seeks us, finds us, passionately searches for us when we reject Him, and loves us unto death. The disciple is the one who, even in their sinfulness, acknowledges this love. A true disciple learns to love Love Himself.



Registration:

Religious Education Registration will be held online beginning on **Wednesday**, **September 1**st and will conclude on **Friday**, **September 10**th

First Day of Class:

Wednesday, September 15th – 4:00-5:00 P.M. Our Religious Education classes will be held primarily online for this School Year and will be taught by IC School Professional Teachers (most at the grade level they teach daily.) Classes will meet virtually on a weekly basis on Wednesdays from 4:00-5:00 P.M. via Zoom Video Conferencing. This year, all grade levels will also meet in-person for Religious Education Class on certain dates.

Sacramental Programs:

**Immaculate Conception Parish Policy states that students must attend Religious Education classes in Grades One and Two to receive the Sacraments of Reconciliation and First Communion in Grade Two.

Students must attend Religious Education classes in Grades Six and Seven to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation in Grade Eight.





Gospel Meditation - Encourage a Deeper Understanding of Scripture



St. Oscar Romero said, "We cannot do everything, and there is a sense of liberation in realizing that. This enables us to do something and to do it very well. It may be incomplete, but it is the beginning, a step along the way, an opportunity for the Lord's grace to enter and do the rest."

There were a group of ladies many years ago who made quilts. They were beautiful creations reflecting inspirational designs artfully composed from the simple scraps of fabric each woman would bring to their individual pieces. There was no plan for the finished project as each finished work

became the combined creation of what each woman contributed. They abounded in vibrant colors and dazzled the beholder with intricate patterns and their myriad textures. They were so beautiful that they became coveted family treasures passed from generation to generation. Those women never realized the power of their work. Countless babies rested in the comfort of those quilts warmly nestled in the legacy of tradition they were fortunate to inherit. They adorned countless homes with their beauty and brought joy and solace to many faces.

We cannot do everything. We are not meant to. Our work in life is to contribute our individual piece, a piece that reflects the unique thumbprint I claim as my own. We only have to do small things well. Then, as St. Oscar Romero reminds us, the Lord's grace will enter and do the rest. We have to trust that this is true just as those women trusted in the eventual beauty of their final work.

Eucharistic blessings are blessings that start small and multiply. We all come to life with only a few loaves of bread and a few fish. Not any single one of us has all that it takes to transform our world. Who knows what God will do with the little we have and how many will benefit from our kindness, compassion, wisdom, courage, conviction, love, warmth, zeal, faith, and hope? That young lad never dreamed that his few leftovers would do all that they did. God shows up in unexpected ways! Where would life's adventure and fun be if it were any other way? Being able to be part of bringing God's creative, transforming, healing to the world opens us up to wonder, awe, and excitement! We can all bring our little piece to the bigger work of God that can result in being a coveted jewel passed generation to generation. This is good news indeed!
