This weekend is the Solemnity of the Ascension. It also marks the anniversary of my Ordination to the priesthood (May 16th), which occurred six years ago, a day after my 27th birthday. This year is unique in this sense: I have now spent more time in the parish than I have in major seminary (5 years vs. 6 years). In that span of time, some classmates have left the priesthood for personal reasons. Some have taken time off for health reasons and family reasons. Others have lost parents and family expectedly and unexpectedly. Some, like myself, have become pastors. Others have been elevated to positions of greater responsibility and travel the country,



whereas others still are in small, rural churches which are at best hundreds of miles away from another parish. In these past six years, some priests have experienced issues with their physical health, while others struggled with their mental health. They celebrated funerals and weddings on the same day. They listened to joyful and devastating news in the same hour. They have been asked to pray for others when, at times, it has been difficult to pray for themselves.

I do not write this litany to depress either myself or you, but rather as a way of reflecting upon my own journey of faith thus far. I admire my classmates who, despite the chaos and cruelties of the world that we all face at times, have been able to look to God and minister to His people. They have taken the difficulties of life and made it so they can grow in God's love. "I have learned, in whatever state I am, to be content. I know how to be abased, and I know how to abound; in any and all circumstances I have learned the secret of facing plenty and hunger, abundance and want. I can do all things in him who strengthens me" (Phil 4:11-13).

When I recount all these things above, my friends and I are reminded of Jesus and his life. In reality, we are reminded of all holy men and women who lived this same life. From Abraham to Moses, David to Jeremiah, Peter and Paul, Joseph and Mary, each of them processing the mysterious will of God as time marches forward. In many ways, faith is a sublime experience—it challenges our comfort and presumptions. But all of this, while it seems frightening at first, is always in service of God's will. "What eye has not seen, and ear has not heard, and what has not entered the human heart, what God has prepared for those who love him; this God has revealed to us through the Spirit. For the Spirit scrutinizes everything, even the depths of God" (1 Cor 2:9-10). Our worldview is challenged so frequently so that we can comprehend the immensity of God's mission for us.

The shortest way to express it all is that it is a mystery. All the prayers we have learned throughout our entire lives —"give us this day our daily bread," "lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil," "pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death," "to thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve," "you my child shall be called the prophet of the Most High, for you will go before the Lord to prepare his way, to give his people knowledge of salvation by the forgiveness of sins." — they take on a new meaning in priesthood, truly.

In all my experiences, God has "shown the strength of his arm." He has allowed me to witness life and death, to laugh and to cry, to doubt and be confident—sometimes in a single day. That feeling of 'smallness,' if you will, is the same opportunity to recognize the God of all who loves me and who loves you too. That is, I believe, the source of confidence I have in this path God has called me to walk on.

Thank you for your love and support of me. Consider praying for and supporting the different priests in your life this month, as many celebrate their anniversaries around this time. May we all be blessed as we conclude our Easter Season!

Coming Soon: Breaking Bread Hymnals Return To Our Pews...





Dear IC Parishioners,

It seems like years have passed since I was last able to update you on Liturgical matters in our weekly bulletin. This has indeed been a trying time in our everyday life, as well as in the life of the Church. Fortunately, things are beginning to gradually return to some semblance of what we think of as normal. With the recent announcement of expanded capacity with regards to public gatherings, we are also expecting word soon from the Archdiocese regarding the restoration of more Liturgical norms during Mass.

What does this mean? Well, quite frankly, probably not the restoration of our choirs, or even encouraging congregational singing. With that said, I am expecting the ban on paper to be lifted in the next week or so. You may be asking yourself, 'if we cannot sing as a congregation, what is the point'? The return of our *Breaking Bread* Hymnals will help us transition to the "New Normal" in the following ways:

- Even though we will not encourage congregational singing (at least not immediately), you will be able to follow the texts of the hymns more closely. I know I often say to myself, what word did the cantor/quartet just sing that I missed? For now, you will at least be able to pray with the text in front of you while listening to the music.
- Our hymnals will include the weekend readings as well as the daily Mass readings.
- The hymnals will provide a transition to our proposed use of both paper worship aids and the use of electronic worship aids, such as Apple and Android Apps.

I know none of this is ideal, but at least it is a step in the right direction. Fr. Matt and I will keep you updated on the use of electronic apps on your smart devices as the technology and content offerings improve over the next few months.

I do hope you have found our professional quartet and addition of various instrumentalists at our Masses helpful in your prayer, and in your experience at Mass in general. We have tried to keep music in the church as "present" as possible, given the constraints of the pandemic.





Gospel Meditation - Encourage a Deeper Understanding of Scripture



God remains where love remains. When a believer realizes without doubt that God is love, it is a powerful moment. Being able to place our resurrection trust in this fundamental truth allows us to experience God's presence in all of our experiences: the good and the bad, positive and negative, life enriching and destructive events we encounter. It is no wonder that St. Paul so accurately tells us that it is love that endures all things and lasts. How can God not endure or ever fade away? Because he is God, Jesus also guarded and protected his disciples as the endearing shepherd who always had their best interest at heart.

If we become too immersed in the world, we lose touch with these deeper realities. We can become so preoccupied with preserving what we have created or think that we need, forgetting that it is not building our city that really matters, but God's. Jesus clearly did not belong to the world and, by virtue of his resurrection, he tries to get us to understand that we do not either. The truth brings us to other worldly, more divine places and takes our eyes off of the concerns that often captivate our fears and storm our senses.

Life can easily erode our faith. Think of your life over the last couple of weeks. What challenged your faith and distracted your divine glance? Even being overly stimulated with technology and social media can erode our sense of confidence and cause us to forget who we really are. We need to distance ourselves from the world in order to experience the joy that Christ offers. The world will never like the word of God. It is too challenging and too perplexing. The world mistakenly believes that it can survive on its own. It is a mistaken judgment that may cost people a lot in the end. It is all so very simple: God remains when we love one another. If in all the business of our lives and all that each day brings, the good and the bad, we follow the call and path of love, we will walk with God. There is nothing to fear and anxiety finds no home.
