Discernment Process

Immaculate Conception, St. Juliana, Mary, Seat of Wisdom, Our Lady of Hope, Our Lady of Ransom and *St. Paul of the Cross* Parishes engaged in the Renew My Church (RMC) review and discernment process through the past few months. The Grouping Feedback and Discernment team (GFDT), which was made up of members from each community, met to review and discern the future parish structure for the area. Our deepest appreciation goes to the GFDT who prayerfully discerned the parish grouping structure during this challenging time of the global pandemic.



Based on their meetings and feedback gathered from the larger parish community, they submitted feedback to the archdiocese. The Archdiocesan Standards and Recommendations Commission, which includes representatives from across the Archdiocese of Chicago, reviewed the feedback and other information, including financial summaries and parish trends.

Cardinal Cupich and Bishop Bartosic are grateful to *Fr. Heinrich, Fr. Wallace, Fr. Ho, Fr. Oleksy, Fr. Bozovsky, Fr. Berchmans* and the Grouping Team who gathered throughout the past few months, and all parishioners who offered feedback through the recent discernment process.

<u>Outcome</u>

In the past few weeks, Cardinal Blase J. Cupich, Archbishop of Chicago, the archdiocese's auxiliary bishops, and the archdiocese's Presbyteral Council met to discuss the Commission's recommendation. Based upon those discussions and prayerful consideration, Cardinal Cupich made the following decisions regarding the parish structure in the O'Hare Neighborhood grouping.

Effective July 1, 2021, Our Lady of Hope will become a mission of Mary, Seat of Wisdom parish.

- Regular Sunday Worship will continue at both locations, Mary, Seat of Wisdom and the Mission of Our Lady of Hope.
- Fr. Derek Ho continues as Pastor at Mary, Seat of Wisdom.
- Fr. Wojciech Oleksy will serve as the Mission Director until he is reassigned, at which time a new director will be assigned.
- Mass schedules at each location after July 1st will be a priority topic for the pastor, Mission Director and parish leadership in the coming months.
- The Parish will be known as Mary, Seat of Wisdom and Our Lady of Hope Mission.

Immaculate Conception, St. Juliana, St. Paul of the Cross and Our Lady of Ransom will remain in their current structures as each meet and exceed the foundational principals.

Parish Structure Rationale

Over the past few months, Our Lady of Hope has discerned, very clearly, its three-fold mission:

- As the only Church, Catholic or otherwise in Rosemont, Our Lady of Hope serves current and future parishioners in that area.
- Further, Our Lady of Hope provides an outstanding daily Mass opportunity to the business population in that area, similar to St. Peters in the Loop.
- And finally, Our Lady of Hope provides an important missionary service to the travelers and hospitality / convention industry near the airport.

This three-fold mission will serve as the focus for Our Lady of Hope to be a dedicated mission in the future, rather than be fully united to Mary, Seat of Wisdom.

Congratulations to all six parishes as they embarked upon a deep reflection and assessment process, first looking at how each Parish is supporting disciples on their journey of faith and then investigating the five strategies for renewal of parish life.

Collectively we know that it is only disciples who can help to support and make new disciples. Your preliminary work, for all six parishes in this area, will serve you well as you continue onto the next phase of **Renew My Church**, called **Building the New Reality**. The overarching goal of the next phase, is to continue to raise up, support and deepen discipleship in all parishioners, assisting all parishioners on their journey to become Missionary Disciples for the work of evangelization. <u>Next Steps</u>

The parish communities will embark upon the next phase of renewal, focusing on strong evangelization to the world around us. The renewal process calls us to become a stronger, more sustainable presence for the future, capable of reaching more people in their work of making disciples of Jesus Christ, building communities with one another and inspiring witness in the world around us.

Reflections From Fr. Robert Carlton: Prison Ministry

In Matthew Chapter 25, we hear from Jesus: "Come you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me." This comes from a passage in Matthew's Gospel that gets at how we, as followers of



Jesus, ought to conduct ourselves towards each other and how, ultimately, we will be judged by Jesus. Interestingly, the criteria on which we are to be judged has nothing about the Ten Commandments nor anything about what one would regularly consider to be "*religious obligations*." Rather, the question that Jesus seems to be asking us is: did we love all of the children of God that we met in our lives and not just those that are easy to love, but, instead, *all* of them?

A group of people that is easy to view as being separated from society and easy to not pay much attention to are those that are in jail. However, Jesus himself mentions multiple times in the Gospels the importance of visiting those who are in jail and showing compassion to them and Pope Francis has made visiting the incarcerated a focus of his efforts when he travels all over the world. One of the things that I have been doing weekly for a period of time now and have enjoyed very much is visiting the inmates in the Metropolitan Correctional Center in downtown Chicago. The inmates in that jail are either awaiting trial on Federal charges, been convicted on Federal charges and are awaiting sentencing or those who have already been convicted and been given shorter sentences that they would serve there. By and large, I have found the majority of inmates that I have met to be very intelligent, articulate and outgoing people. I spoke with an attorney who was representing clients that were in the jail and he said that his impression was that a lot of these guys in there could have been president of a company or been very successful in marketing if they had received better advice and had better influences earlier in their lives and that is something that I would certainly agree with. I have also found the staff and guards there to be, by and large, sincere people that genuinely care about the inmates that they are supervising.

One of the great lessons of the spiritual life, and what I think this type of ministry does a very good job of challenging someone in, is the instruction of St. Ignatius to go and meet the people that one is serving where they are. In the case of this ministry, this would involve literally going to where the people are since the jail has been under Coronavirus-related lockdown restrictions for over a year now. However, the main point Ignatius was trying to make here was that when you are meeting someone or serving them, you have to go work with and meet them the way that they are and not the way that you would want them to be or think they should be. Looked at this way, ministering in a jail would require not wondering about anyone's particular case or why they are there in the first place, but intentionally telling yourself that these are children of God in the same way that anyone else is and they should be accorded the same level of respect that anyone would want when you meet them, regardless of the bad decisions that anyone may have made in the past.

Gospel Meditation - Encourage a Deeper Understanding of Scripture



Begin by taking a moment to calm yourself, focus on your breathing and become aware of the life force that flows through your veins. Center yourself in the words and affections of St. Augustine's Prayer to the Holy Spirit, "Breath in me, O Holy Spirit, that my thoughts may all be holy. Act in me, O Holy Spirit, that my work, too, may be holy. Draw my heart, O Holy Spirit, that I love but what is holy. Strengthen me, O Holy Spirit, to defend all that is holy. Guard me, then, O Holy Spirit, that I may always be holy." Sanctifying, bringing things to wholeness, blessing, restoring and creating are just some of the fruits of the presence of the Holy Spirit. Being filled with the Holy

Spirit is not always about proclaiming loud cries of praise or singing alleluia from a roof top. It is about unfolding and encountering the ordinary in an extraordinary way. Being filled with the Holy Spirit means being filled with the fullness of God's life and in touch with the power and wonder of God's presence. It's about becoming holy.

It is not just for saints or people who have a religious vocation. Holiness is for the ordinary, simple run-of-the-mill person who desires to love God, others, and all of creation. When an ordinary, humble person becomes connected with life and the wondrous power of God's love, they begin to live life more deeply, a bit more reverently, desire a simple fare and find themselves relishing in ordinary beauty. Their senses become attuned to the Author of life and they realize that they are not alone. The Holy Spirit connects all of the dots of human experience and existence, bringing everyone to center on the Divine Presence. The Holy Spirit does not just breathe "on me" but "in me" and is the force behind every breath I take. Take a moment to soak that thought in. There is the Divine Presence of the Holy Spirit in me, right now. When a person becomes in touch with truth, they know that when inspired by the Holy Spirit, his or her actions are not solely their own. They realize that they are moved by Divine Grace and drawn to things not found in secular affairs.

We live in a world where it is hard to discover truth. Real truth is veiled by so many imposters that it is hard to find, especially for those who are young. It is easy to get fooled and duped and often, without full conscious awareness of doing so, we choose to walk down a path of self-absorption and destruction. It is only the Holy Spirit, through the ministry of the church most especially, who guides us to truth and shows us the way to be the graced and holy human beings God made us to be. The wonders and inspirations of today's Feast of Pentecost are necessary to share with both those we love and those who only casually cross our paths. The first disciples, touched by the Holy Spirit, brought the Gospel to the ends of the earth one step at a time. Is it unrealistic to ask that we assist in that same mission by helping people understand who they are and who God is one at a time? Ask the Holy Spirit to alleviate the fear in your heart that prevents you from doing so. ©LPi

Everyday Stewardship - Recognize God in your Ordinary Moments

You Don't Have What It Takes - But You Will...

Those of us in ministry love this saying: *God doesn't call the equipped. He equips the called*. We all know that sort of queasy feeling we get in the pit of our stomachs when it becomes clear what we're supposed to do, in any situation. It's that feeling of: *Oh, no. Not me. Not now. I can't.*

We've all got our list of reasons why not, don't we? We do it for everything, from big life problems to small everyday choices. I'm not going to invite my neighbor to church because I don't want to come across as pushy. I'm not going to make amends with my cousin because she'll just walk all over me again. I'm not going to say a Rosary tonight because I'm tired and it'll just stress me out.



However, even if we all put our lists of "*reasons why we can't*" together, I don't think any of us have reasons quite as valid as the apostles. Their job was to convert the nations — and here they are, a bunch of fishermen who haven't been out of Judea, who speak only their own languages. Were they supposed to preach the Gospel via a particularly compelling game of charades?

But even that big, giant, stop-you-dead-in-your tracks Reason Why We Can't was nothing, because God had a plan. He didn't call a bunch of equipped men. He called them, and He equipped them. Cue the tongues of fire! God doesn't call us to do His will because we have what it takes. He calls us because He's ready to give us what it takes.
