

### **Subject: Reopening Plan for Immaculate Conception Parish amid COVID-19**

Dear IC Family,

I pray that you and your loved ones are healthy. As you may have seen reported in the media, Cardinal Cupich recently shared our multi-phased plan for reopening churches in the Archdiocese of Chicago.

Specifically:

- *Phase I* allows for parishes to reopen for Baptism, Reconciliation, Weddings and Funerals with a limit of 10 attendees. Our Parish Office and campus will remain closed for meetings during this time.
- *Phase IA* allows for parishes to reopen for private prayer and adoration with a limit of 10 attendees. Our Parish Office and campus will continue to remain closed for meetings.
- *Phase II* allows for reopening for weekday and weekend Masses for larger groups depending upon the guidelines set forth by our state and the capacity of each church building.

### **Our IC Reopening Plan**

First and foremost, it is important for everyone to understand that our efforts will prioritize the safety and well-being of all, while also maintaining all due respect and reverence for the sacraments and liturgical norms of our faith.

To facilitate this endeavor, I will assemble a Parish Reopening Leadership Team with parishioner co-captains to lead our efforts. Together, we will attend required training from the Archdiocese to ensure that our parish reopening plan conforms to the guidelines developed by the Archdiocese in collaboration with civil and healthcare authorities. We will also receive a starter kit of protective and cleaning supplies, as well as guidance on purchasing/maintaining additional supplies on an ongoing basis.

### **Estimated Timing for our Reopening for Phase 1 and 1A only**

The required training for Pastors and Parish Reopening Leadership Team members is currently being conducted by our Archdiocese via a one-hour webinar (through Microsoft Teams.) Training sessions began on Monday, May 18th and will continue as needed (until a sufficient amount of volunteers have stepped forward to staff our required teams.) Once we successfully complete the training, we will need to review and complete tasks assigned to all parishes as part of a reopening certification process in order to be approved by the Archdiocese. Therefore, the soonest that IC will realistically open for sacramental celebrations or private prayer is likely the first weekend of June. That said, our parish, like all others in the Archdiocese, will move forward at a pace and timing appropriate for our own situation.

Ultimately, our timetable for reopening will largely depend upon the response we receive from this appeal for viable volunteers to assist us.

### Volunteers Needed – seeking healthy adults age 65 or younger

We will need volunteers to assist with various aspects of our parish reopening plan. Please note: leadership team members and volunteers must not be a part of a “vulnerable population” (essentially, not over the age of 65, with no underlying medical conditions such as diabetes, lung disease, or undergoing cancer treatment, etc.). I ask all of you, particularly our school parents, and all those in our parish who are younger than 65 and healthy (with no underlying health conditions) to kindly consider assisting us with one of our three reopening teams:

- **Set-up team:** Sample duties include ensuring that all supplies needed for each sacramental celebration/gathering are ready for use, entrances and exits are marked and propped physically open prior to attendees' arrival/departure, windows are opened, etc.
- **Greeting team:** Sample duties include assisting in managing the flow of congregants as they enter the church, making sure attendees use hand sanitizer upon entering, are wearing a mask, and are reminded not to enter if ill; directing people to appropriate seating/waiting areas, etc.
- **Cleaning team:** Sample duties include maintaining and cleaning essential and trafficked areas of the church before and after the church has been used. Masks and gloves will be provided (if you do not have your own) in addition to approved cleaning/disinfecting supplies.

Our Reopening Leadership Team and I will make certain that all our volunteers are properly trained. Please send me a message at [fr.robert@icparish.info](mailto:fr.robert@icparish.info) to indicate your willingness and ability to volunteer. From those that step forward, we will also request that some act as volunteer captains to help lead each of the three teams.

At IC, we will only open our church once our Reopening Leadership Team and I feel confident that we have the right volunteers in place to make it possible to reopen. Again, the need for parishioner assistance cannot be overstated as this multi-phased plan will truly require a team effort to manage successfully. We will not be able to reopen our doors and welcome our parishioners back home unless the younger members of our parish family graciously step forward to volunteer their time to benefit the greater good of our community.

The guidelines and measures required to reopen are designed to protect our well-being and that of our broader community. As Cardinal Cupich has noted, from the first pages of Scripture we learn that we indeed are “*our brother's keeper*.” Our Lord Jesus Christ prayed, “*that they all may be one*” (John 17:21) and commanded us to “*love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another*” (John 13:34). Our collective patience, willingness to help and the care we take to reopen is a demonstration of our unity and love for one another as a parish family.

### *Prayer for Priests...*







Bringing a light in the midst of darkness




Are you feeling overwhelmed by the effects of the pandemic and in need of prayer? We are here to pray with you and ask God for your needs.



### Gospel Meditation - Encourage a Deeper Understanding of Scripture



A pair of ducks found their way to the same little corner of the property year after year. Sheltered by a little grove of trees, they quickly made their preparations to build a nest, lay eggs, and welcome in a new family. Then one year, only one of the ducks came to that little corner. She went about the business of building a nest, but this time, she was clearly unsettled. She would wander around, sometimes seemingly without purpose, almost hoping perhaps that her mate might come along. But, she remained alone. There were many times when we could hear her "crying", mourning her loneliness and lack of purpose, sitting on a batch of eggs that would never hatch. One day, she quietly left that little corner never to return again.

Many human beings approach life this way. We silently grieve our loneliness, lack of direction, and sense of purpose. Maybe life once had meaning for us, but nothing seems to claim us and settle our restlessness any longer. We wander around looking and hoping for someone or something to come our way. We may even sob at times, wailing as we sit with the misery of our pain. Will happiness ever come our way again? Or will we simply leave where we are never to return again? Many are lost, wandering souls who are not quite sure where to settle or where to make a home.

We are meant to be in Christ. This glorious feast of the Ascension shows us, with clear vision, who Jesus really is! Understanding ourselves in Christ really changes things up and reorients us to our greater purpose, mission, and meaning. We are part of the cosmic wonder of creation and part of a bigger plan and mystery, destined to be much more than what we now know ourselves to be. Could Jesus' friends know who he would become? If we can find the Christ present within and see the Christ bursting forth in all creation and beyond, then we can come to know our truth and understand where our home and life is meant to be.

Advancing upon the blessing of each new day with the certain knowledge that you are an unconditionally loved child of God gives you the axis and the safe harbor to cope with whatever comes your way. The gift of joy will be yours, and you can discover your true meaning and purpose. Look within, look without, look above, and look below. You are not alone. Trust that God will lead you where you need to be and transform you into who you really are.
