

## Catholic Education

An aside: I wanted to briefly highlight our Catholic Schools before going on to my main point. I think it is a shame that our public figures, especially here in Chicago, have not been more laudatory of the Catholic School system and their ability to navigate this pandemic with poise and grace. Has it been perfect? Of course not - but considering the immense challenges of reopening, our staff here at IC met it with an equal dedication. I would at least like to hear some acknowledgment of the work the Archdiocese has done to invest in our children and communities from our city.



Looking more broadly than our grade schools, I think it also stands that we reflect as a Church and a community about what our education actually aims to be. While campuses are placed in communities where generations might benefit, the spirit of Catholic education has existed well before our schooling system.

First, the basic principles: God is one. God is true. God is good.

Since God is one, and all is created through Him, each thing has its own unique characteristic and being. We are not a collective, we are each distinct. The fact that we are unique means we have something unique to give. The Trinity is One though it has three distinct Persons. One in Being and one in Love, yet still distinct. That is the call for those in the Church.

God is true, meaning that he is not only the source of truth but the foundation by which we say anything is true. It is popular today to say "my truth" which, in the end, is not necessarily truth. Our feelings can be a sort of truth and even our preferences too, but truth is by nature objective—it can be perceived and understood by all who apply themselves to it. Truth is a struggle requiring agreement, disagreement, and refining. Truth doesn't just look for 'what works' but rather 'what is best.'

The goodness of God extends to His creation—He made all things good. From the micro- to the macroscopic, all things came from the source of goodness. Because of its goodness, it can serve both worldly and spiritual needs, since both body and soul are good as well.

How is this related to Catholic education? God is the source and Father of all, yet, as the Psalmist says, "You have made man little less than a god, crowned him with glory and honor. You have given him rule over the works of your hands, put all things at his feet" (Ps 8:6-7). God has shared his unity, truth, and goodness with us. From the earliest days of the Church, the world and forces of nature were not gods, but rather expressions of the majesty of God. He was not a God interested in power or domination, but of love and unity.

Because things are one in Him, we can wonder at the whole of creation — our education is rooted in a profound wonder at the beauty of creation. Because all things are true in Him, we can be confident that we can grow in knowledge and wisdom, and hand it to another generation to continue our work. Likewise, because things are good in Him, we can see how nature is generous and fruitful.

What this means, ultimately, is that there is a positivity and optimistic outlook at life that counters the depressing and cynical worldview many adopt. Even for adults, who truly experience the gravity and difficulty of life can, nevertheless, be trapped by their own cynicism. The aim of our education is to point to a God that loves the world and loves you, specifically. God is one, true, and good. God is love, and what He is, He has given to us.

## From the Desk of our Director of Operations...

Optimism, a positive state of mind resulting in the belief of a favorable outcome. For the past 15 months it seemed there was little to be optimistic about, but this past weekend I witnessed that the tide is turning.



My wife, Caroline, and I had a chance to visit friends in Northern Michigan. It has been well over a year since we have had a chance to be with one another. Knowing that we were all vaccinated gave us confidence to make the visit possible. Saturday turned out to be a gorgeous day and we took advantage of it. We visited small towns, National Parks, and small local businesses. It was good to see that everywhere we went, people were out and about enjoying life again.

Pentecost Sunday, we went to Mass at St. Mary of the Assumption, in Lake Leelanau, MI. Mass was to be celebrated outside under a tent, but typical Northern Michigan weather turned damp, windy and cold so it was moved inside. Fr. Michael Lingaur, educated at Mundelein Seminary, was newly ordained the day prior. He returned to his home parish to say his first Mass. With nearly ninety percent of the county vaccinated, the church was full, masks were optional, and the congregation was singing. Normal had never seemed so special to me before. Although the reopening in Chicago lags a bit behind the small towns up north, I am optimistic that we will see normal again soon.

I am also optimistic that it will not be long before our own restrictions will be lifted and we will be able to celebrate the Eucharist, as one body once again. I miss seeing our church filled with friends and families. Going to church at St. Mary of the Assumption, filled with parishioners, gave me hope that our parish community will be united once again.

This is such a great community. For the past 15 months, I have been amazed at the generosity and effort given to support our Parish. Led by Father Matt, we pivoted to technology, livestreaming our Masses. Our volunteers ensured that we were all safe as we started a partial return to church last summer. And as the school days dwindle down, thanks go out to our teachers, staff and Principal Canzoneri for providing a safe and healthy environment for in-person learning this past year.

And I am truly thankful for your continued donations and financial support through this unprecedented period. They have been the lifeline of our parish. And I am optimistic that as our church can begin to return to normal and increase our capacity, that we will be able to count on you to continue to be generous. With our Mass attendance limited to 25% capacity for this current fiscal year, collections are down 15% (\$95,000 YTD). I am happy to report though that our Christmas and Easter collections both came in on budget. Looking forward, I am optimistic that over time, we will make up the 15% with the help of our IC community.

As we continue to increase our capacity and you are comfortable, please come to church, we would love to see you again.

Art class looks a little different this year. Due to the global pandemic and safety precautions, we have not been able to use our beautiful Art room or share materials. This has made for a challenging year. We have still enjoyed Art class, but it is all done from a cart that travels from room to room. 



# Gospel Meditation - Encourage a Deeper Understanding of Scripture



Let God be who God is. This is often one of the hardest things to do. Rather than allowing the mystery of being created in the image and likeness of God unfold and take root in our lives, we change the dynamic. We want to be the creators who want to make God into the image and likeness we need God to be. We have a hard-enough time letting the people in our lives be who they are. We struggle even more so with God. It is almost as if we want God to be our imaginary friend who is not only with us whenever we need but becomes the Being we need God to be. Who is it that we want God to be today? A protector, disciplinarian, champion for justice, healer, advocate for our cause, grantor of prayers, guardian of my life, or the

avenger? Our prayers tell an interesting story. When you pray, what does God look like?

Recently, a young woman who was feeling invisible, overlooked, ignored, and misunderstood by her husband struggled to make her feelings known and get his attention. Finally, she screamed, "Listen to me!" Thus, birth was given to a renewed and healthier relationship. We spend so much time storming heaven with our agenda and trying to make God into a "god" of our desires that we do not hear God saying, "Listen to me!" God is desperately trying to get our attention. God is saying, I am here among you as not one but three, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Many people seldom notice God's presence because they are so caught up with other spiritual cares and concerns. And, when the "god" they fashion and create doesn't produce as they desire, they shake the dust from their feet and move on. "I tried," they exclaim, "but God didn't listen."

Healthy relationships aren't built on making someone be who we need them to be. Healthy relationships are built on encounters of persons and the development of an appreciation of someone solely for who they are. Deeper relationships can even be found with two people marveling at each other and almost experiencing a childlike joy and giddiness when they see the other coming. Do you ever have these feelings about God? Believe it or not, God does for you! There is a joyful laughter that gives rise to and connects all three members of the Holy Trinity. It is this laughter, flowing from the very depths of the Godhead that not only keeps the Trinity in joyful unity but spills over into the creation of all beings and things. It is an expression of Divine Delight! Have you ever taken time away from your agenda to experience the Divine Joyfulness of God? We can reach a connection of Presence wherein even the smallest of creatures suddenly radiate the fullness of God: the wonderful creation of their being, the innocence and playfulness of their movements, and the sustaining life breath that flows through their veins.
