Communion Is Not Only A Sign, But A Symbol As Well

Our faith teaches us that the Eucharist we receive, the sacrament we celebrate, is a *sign*. Without going into more technical language, a *symbol* is something that represents something else. A sign, in the Catholic terminology, is something that indicates, pointing to a reality present. While imperfect, an analogy for this would be a married couple: their rings symbolize their vows, bond, and commitment. On the other hand, the couple themselves signify, as together they are a sign of their vows, bond, and commitment.



The Eucharist is a sign of God's love, not merely symbolic of it. We believe that it is the real presence of Jesus Christ, Body and Blood, in the sacrament. In my view, it is the supreme object, expression, and sacrament of our faith. This is because it is the sacrament which focuses on the redemption and salvation of the human race and our union of man with God. In the sacrament, we truly receive Jesus Christ and are the beneficiaries of his sacrifice.

This is not to minimize the usefulness of symbols. Most wedding couples value their rings immensely. They are not merely symbols, but important ones. As such, the symbolism of the Eucharist is also important.

I taught our Second Grade students about this symbolism, expressing to them how what we use for the sacrament (the bread and wine) teaches us about what we believe. In particular, I spoke to them about the bread they receive:

- 1) The bread, if you look closely, is made of wheat ground together. It is quite literally a "*communion*" of many parts. This was an insight of many saints, including St. Ignatius of Antioch (2nd century AD). The bread is the image of our faith—many parts, but one. Especially in the early Church, it also symbolized unity in our suffering.
- 2) The bread is similar to the bread Jesus used at the Last Supper. While the bread may taste and look bland, it is made to imitate the sort of bread Jesus himself used. He celebrated the Passover with his disciples and established a New Passover and a New Covenant. We honor the actions of Jesus by using his words, his actions, and how he celebrated the sacrament. Using this bread, we not only connect ourselves to Jesus, but to our ancestors in faith.
- 3) The blandness of the bread is also intentional, as opposed to something sweet or flavorful, and this is on purpose. This bread is referred to originally as the "*bread of affliction*" (Dt 16:3) in the Old Testament. This bread of affliction (or '*sadness*' and '*suffering*' as I mentioned to our Second Grade children) was traditionally understood to remind the Israelites of their bitter slavery. This reminder served two purposes, namely to remember God's graciousness to them and to remember the suffering that comes from sin—that is to say, do works which heal sin and suffering in our midst.

Jesus uses this same bread to remind us of the reality of sin—people to this day live in darkness and slavery. We use this bread and celebrate the Eucharist to offer that to the God who freed us from the ancient slavery of sin and death. Likewise, we celebrate the Mass to remind us to be kind to those who suffer, patient and forgiving of those who sin, and willing to live out, boldly, the mission of Christ.

This mission is expressed in our lives, not just our Mass. We sacrifice at the altar of the Mass that our lives might be a fitting sacrifice in the altar of life. We must proclaim the name of Jesus by which all people are saved.

Blessing of Mothers

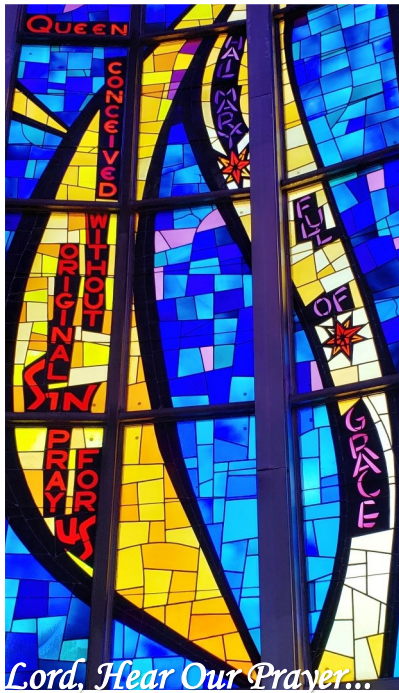

Gospel Meditation - Encourage a Deeper Understanding of Scripture



"Remain in my love," and *"I call you friends,"* are powerful words that are found in John's Gospel. Most of us probably have them committed to memory or have at least heard them proclaimed dozens of times. They are words that can easily become trite and quickly glossed over without fully pondering and digesting their profound beauty. When we take the time to immerse ourselves in them, they can radically change our lives and our relationships. They can open up new doors of adventure and hold countless possibilities for meaning. The essence of love and friendship are things that can easily be taken for granted. They have always been there and are a significant part of our lives.

Many would say that they could not live without love and friendship, and they put a great deal of care into preserving, deepening and sustaining them. Love and friendship share a mutual relationship with each other that deserves more reflection.

Where does love come from? We can consider relationships that have not succeeded and conclude that they were somehow due to our *"failures in love."* In doing so, we assume that human beings are the ones responsible for love, its success and also its failure. While our weakness, emotional composition and sinfulness can easily impact our ability to love, its origin is not human. God is love. God is love's author and origin. When we love, it is God who loves in and through us. It is because of this divine closeness that Jesus is able to call us friends! It is not because of anything we have done but simply because of who we are. Realizing and contemplating this awesome reality becomes a game changer across the board. It gives us reason to clear the table of anything that can adversely affect the way we love so that we can open the door for its author to shine forth.

Coming upon this truth is what leads folks like St. Francis of Assisi to leave that which is comfortable and worldly and live a radical life. They relate with the love of God that radiates in and through all living things and appreciate their sacredness. It was having an intimate experience of God's love and friendship that propelled St. Francis and others to embrace simplicity, act nonviolently, pursue humility, love enemies, care for the earth and open up avenues for true justice. Understanding this profound truth will also help us find peaceful solutions to world's problems, restore relationships with our sisters and brothers, bring the grace of loving stewardship to creation and heal many wounds. Once we begin to see how wonderfully holy all of life really is, we discover joy. We lose our need for fear, develop a fierce fortitude, act prudently and seek justice. There is great power in love because it comes from God. It will never fail. It also enjoys the company of two other friends who are eager to become our friends as well: faith and hope. Choosing to Love One Another

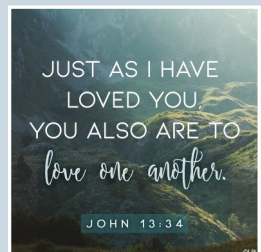
Love one another. The greatest commandment, the simplest commandment — and if you've ever loved anyone, you know it's also the hardest.

I'm man enough to admit it. I've seen one or two of those cheesy Hallmark movies that are especially popular around the holidays. Boy meets Girl. Boy and Girl encounter a catastrophic roadblock to their relationship — they're coaches of rival high school volleyball teams, or he runs a dog kennel and she works at a feline rescue, so it could never, ever work out, right? But sprinkle a little movie magic over the whole situation and Boy and Girl find what Hallmark tells us is true love.

I could make a list of all the things that are inaccurate about these movies, and something I would put right near the top — maybe even above the sometimes-unbelievable storylines — is the idea that love is a feeling. See, I'm not sure if it's accurate to call these movies love stories. Attraction stories, sure. But if you've ever forgiven someone who's hurt you, nursed a dying parent, gotten up for an infant's night feeding or let your kid have the last piece of cake, you know that real love is a verb. It's something you do. And it is almost always a choice.

Love one another. How often do we hear this? How often do we think about what it really means? How often do we take a moment to consider the action Jesus is asking us to take and the choice he is asking us to make?
