

Reflections From Fr. Robert Carlton: All Saints



At the beginning of this month, the Church marked the great solemnity of All Saints Day, in which the Church celebrates the life and work of all the saints in the Church.

This refers to the saints that are known to everyone (such as St. Francis of Assisi), saints that are only known to some, and then saints whose holiness and virtue are known only to God. Given this solemnity, it is worth reflecting upon the lives of the saints and what specifically made them holy and worthy of being called saints. It can be easy to look at the saints and see people who led lives of such great holiness and virtue that they are almost a group of people set apart. Indeed, reading about people like St. Francis of Assisi, who gave up a life of great comfort and wealth to wander around lonely churches in Tuscany seeking to find enlightenment from God (eventually receiving his commission from God at the San Damiano Church to go and rebuild the Church), would seemingly confirm a belief that the saints really are a group set apart and not subject to normal human limitations. However, I think that All Saints Day provides an effective

opportunity to look at the saints and see that these really were men and women that were subject to all of the same faults and frailties that others are dealing with.

The Gospel reading for All Saints Day is the Beatitudes from the Gospel of Matthew and those represent a good description of the life of a saint. However, I think that when looking at the lives of a lot of the saints, it would be appropriate to add "blessed are the persistent," "blessed are those who get knocked down and keep going," and "blessed are those who keep fighting for what they know to be right." One of the more recently canonized saints is Mother Teresa, who was beatified in 2003 and then canonized in 2016. It can be easy to look at Mother Teresa in the 1980s and 1990s, who was a world celebrity at that point, and see someone who was able to accomplish whatever she wanted and could raise any amount of money to support that. However, I think it is a lot more interesting to look at Mother Teresa in 1948 and 1949 who showed up to Calcutta, knowing no one and walking all throughout the streets of that city, trying to raise money for something that she had no reason to believe would ever be able to get off the ground.

She also knew that she could have simply stopped doing this and gone back to the comfortable life in her convent. Mother Teresa wrote of this time in her life: "While looking for a home I walked and walked until my arms and legs ached. I thought how much the poor must ache in body and soul, looking for a home, food, and health. Then, the comfort of Loreto [her former congregation] came to tempt me: 'You have only to say the word and all that will be yours again,' the Tempter kept on saying...Of free choice, my God, and out of love for You, I desire to remain and do whatever be Your Holy will in my regard. I did not let a single tear come."

There are many other saints who lived lives of virtue and holiness by following what God was calling them to do on a daily basis. Charles Borromeo, whose memorial was celebrated the same week as All Saints Day, spent most of his working life trying to reform the Archdiocese of Milan and traveling all throughout that diocese (in a time when travel was very difficult) to see what was actually going on in the parishes. Also, one of my favorite saints is St. Alphonsus Rodriguez, who was a Jesuit in Spain and came to that order when he was about forty years old. His job for the several decades that he spent in the Jesuits was being the porter at one of their universities in Spain. If one were to look at his resume during this time, it would not be a long one, but he still became a saint because he approached doing little things with great love, and that can be very good advice for anyone to follow.





Gospel Meditation - Encourage a Deeper Understanding of Scripture



"And then they will see 'the Son of Man coming in the clouds' with great power and glory." Take a moment to ponder these words from today's Gospel. How does this image make you feel? For people to truly understand the significance of this message, something profound has to happen within. If we find ourselves reacting with a sense of dread or fear, we have to step back and ask why. Our answer will reveal a great deal about our relationship with God. It's hard to fall in love with a God of whom we are afraid. God does not want us to be afraid. Nor does He want us to align our wills to His in order to avoid some kind of

horrendous eternal consequence. That sounds like too much of a superficial power play on the part of God who continues to seek out His children in love.

In order for these words to carry any type of significant meaning for us, they have to resonate with and touch us on a deeper level. They have to be able to connect some dots and have meaning for us in order for this promise to change our lives. Sometimes we get preoccupied with the uncertainty of our deaths. Not knowing when or how we will eventually die can be unsettling. But, more so than needing an answer to the "when" of death, the "what" of death answer we provide has more significance. What happens to us when we die? Whether we die during the natural course of our lives or when Christ comes again, the experience is the same. If we believe that we are meant to live in union with God eternally and that death completes and does not diminish us, then it is worth our time and effort to wait in vigilant hope of the Lord's coming in glory. Our journey back to God is something beautiful to be desired, not dreaded or feared.

Sadly, many folks believe that life is no more than a random occurrence without any purposeful direction or meaning. Death is simply death and nothing more. For them, the Second Coming of Christ and God's eternal promise have no meaning. When we understand the truth about who we are, it changes things up. We then can see ourselves as works in progress who have the choice to either resist the inspirations of the Divine Artist or give into the wonderful creativity of His will. Life awaiting the fullness of Christ to come becomes an unfolding of Divine surprises and abundant joy. God is eternally merciful, forgiving, and welcoming. It is only when we directly reject this gift and turn our backs on Love itself that we have anything to fear. ©LPi
