

Render to Caesar what is Caesar's

Catholicism has always had an interesting relationship with politics and political philosophy. What began as a counter-cultural, illegal religion eventually became the state religion. It grew up in an empire, survived the destruction of that empire, lived in disparate kingdoms and often apart from them. Catholicism survived plagues, wars, corruption, dissension, false promises, immorality, and in essence, the whole of the human experience. The Church might also be considered the body which preserved the art of law itself, at least in the Roman style (Canon Law, the law of the Church, is based on Roman Law structures), a style used in the US as well.



To that effect, Catholicism has either been lauded or feared in the respective countries it occupies. Even here in the United States, Catholicism was routinely described in the early years as "unamerican," her adherents as "Papists" and many times derogatory slang not fit for an article such as this. The reasons behind this are complex, as all history is, and not always owing to the piety of the Church, but her shortcomings as well.

Having such a long, integrated history with a central body of 'rulers' and rules, the Church is easier to attack because she is easier to identify. Many other religions, after all, do not have a codified set of beliefs or an easily recognizable head or structure, universally speaking (i.e., the synagogue here is not beholden to another one there, nor a mosque, or a temple, etc.).

That was a long way to get to the command of Jesus this weekend where he states, "Then repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God" (Mt 22:21). His words can be interpreted in any manner of ways, but his words alone are not sufficient. While Jesus had no love for the Roman government in particular, he did not seem to express malice in his words either. The actions of Jesus in his ministry allow us to contextualize all of his words and this is how we should proceed:

He did not encourage violence, hatred, immorality, a lack of discipline, rebellion, rioting, grandstanding, arrogance, and sin.

Rather, he encouraged patience, understanding, mercy, forgiveness, mutual respect, dedication, faith, hope, and love.

It reminds me of the words of Psalm 120: "Too long do I live among those who hate peace. When I speak of peace, they are for war."

We speak many times of 'faithful citizenship,' but rarely come to a consensus on what that means. I believe our faith is not beholden to any political party, ruler, ideology, or any such things. Scripture has shown us what happens to the faithful when they place their faith in something (or someone) other than God. Faithful citizenship is standing up to injustice, it is true, but in the *manner* that Jesus did — not in the manner that is pragmatic or expedient in our own minds. Faithful citizenship in any era or country is carrying the Cross, forgiving sins, healing the wounded, being mindful of the poor, and renouncing sin in all its forms, first in ourselves and in others as well.

The United States was founded with the intention of living our faith in freedom, not only privately, but publicly as well. Living our convictions will cause conflict, but not always the negative kind. If we conduct ourselves "worthy of the call we have received" (Eph 4:1), I think we can act rightly in this country as both Catholics and Americans, ashamed of neither.




Scholarship Fund Opportunity...

In response to the economic challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic and to encourage students from IC to attend Catholic high schools, Immaculate Conception Parish would like to start a scholarship fund for graduates of Immaculate Conception School and our Religious Education Program to use for tuition at Catholic high schools. We recognize the value and importance of a Catholic high school education and we hope that this could potentially make a difference in the ability of our graduates to continue their Catholic education. All graduates from Immaculate Conception School or our Religious Education Program who either will attend a Catholic high school next year or are currently enrolled at Catholic high schools would be eligible to apply. Application materials and directions will be posted on our parish website **after January 1, 2021**. While the amount and number of the scholarships available will depend upon the amount of money raised, it is hoped that they would be a minimum of \$500. Also, while it is hoped that the scholarships could be renewed, funding initially is only guaranteed for one year.

Traditionally, the Chicago Marathon has been used as a way to raise money for causes such as this. However, since there is no Chicago Marathon this year, Fr. Robert Carlton will run a half marathon in the Norwood Park Circle on **Sunday**, **November 1**st to kick off the fundraising part of our efforts. Please contact Fr. 



Nobody enjoys paying taxes. Despite our displeasure in being forced to do so, we also realize that the monies generated from taxes allows governments to provide essential services for its people. Corruption really gets our goat, however. When we witness malfeasance, overspending, irresponsibility, and dishonesty in governmental spending, the grave injustices make an already unpleasant and arduous task even more difficult. The inappropriate distribution and use of hard-earned monies can leave a person quite angry and disconnected. It's bad enough the government wants something from me, now God does, too?

God is not concerned necessarily with our money, although its proper use does factor into our faith life. 
