Reflections From Fr. Robert Carlton: Saint John de Brebeuf and Saint Isaac Jogues





In this past week, the Church marked the memorial of Saints John de Brebeuf and Isaac Jogues, who were French missionaries that worked in modern day French Canada and New York State, respectively, in the Seventeenth Century. Both Brebeuf and Jogues were members of the Jesuits, with Brebeuf becoming ordained in 1622 and Jogues receiving ordination in 1636. Brebeuf originally arrived in Quebec in 1625, where he and two other priests and two lay Brothers worked with the Sainte-Marie among the Hurons and then later with the Hurons, with whom Brebeuf ministered for most of the remainder of his life. After a period spent back in France, Brebeuf returned to New France in 1633 and began to develop a complete ethnographic record of the Hurons. His work appeared in the series *The Jesuit Relations*, which was a series of books printed between 1632 and 1673 that constituted the main source on the "*New World*", with Brebeuf's effort considered to be the most substantial that appeared therein. Brebeuf was also a master linguist and was known for learning the Wyandot language that the Huron spoke. Brebeuf was martyred in 1649.

Isaac Jogues, for his part, met Brebeuf in 1636, who promptly told Jogues about all the difficulties and troubles that a missionary would have to face in the New World. This only served to increase Jogues' desire to *"devote himself to labor there for the conversion and welfare of the natives."* Almost immediately after his ordination, Jogues sailed for Quebec and arrived there on July 2, 1636. He and some other priests moved around the missions until 1641, when Jogues became the superior of the St. Mary's Mission in Quebec. In the summer of 1642, Jogues and some others were captured by members of the Iroquois Confederacy, who held him in captivity until the following year when he escaped and returned to France. Despite what he had endured, Jogues wanted to return to the missions, which he did in 1646, to act as the French ambassador to the Mohawk tribe. Not long after Jogues' arrival, the Mohawk experienced an outbreak of infectious disease and they blamed Jogues for the problem and, as a result, killed him on October 18, 1646.

With the memorial of the great missionaries Brebeuf and Jogues in mind, it is worth reflecting on the missionary charism of the Church and the missionary call that all those who have been baptized have. The connotation of a missionary is that this requires someone to make an involved journey to the ends of the world, from which the assumption seems to be that that person would not come back. However, this is not the case, and anyone can have a mission of promoting or spreading the mission of the Church in any location, even within their own home. Indeed, Pope John Paul II in his 1990 *Redemptoris Missio*, points out that "there is a new awareness that missionary activity is a matter for all Christians, all dioceses, and parishes, Church institutions and associations." He goes on to indicate that "missionary activity renews the Church revitalizes faith and Christian identity and offers fresh enthusiasm and new incentive. Faith is strengthened when it is given to others!" Indeed, as with anything in life, a sign of something's vitality is one's willingness to share it with others, and the sign of a vibrant faith community is one in which people are willing to spread their faith. The Pope was also echoing the words of Jesus himself in the Scriptures where he sends his followers out to go spread the faith. Being a missionary, of course, can also take many different forms. How are you in your life spreading the faith, and if someone saw how the faith influences your life, would that be something that they would want to follow?




All Saints' Day Mass Schedule: Monday, November 1st *8:30 A.M. & 7:00 P.M. with Fr. Matt presiding

Gospel Meditation - Encourage a Deeper Understanding of Scripture



When we see God with true sincerity of heart and God passes us along our way, it is only then that we will be able to cry out, "Jesus, son of David, have pity on me!" We have to truly want to be healed by, and in union with, God in order for us to reach out to Him. If God is only an abstract idea, theory, or someone found in the pages of a book, there is no motivation for a relationship and no desire to seek Him. God needs to be real in order for faith to be real. It's all about the journey.

St. Augustine reminds us that "to fall in love with God is the greatest romance; to seek Him the greatest adventure; to find Him the greatest human achievement." We strive after many things and mercy is not always one of them. We think that we can find fulfillment and healing in other things only to discover that we are still short and empty. From the moment human beings were created, God has been calling us and seeking us. He has been walking right beside the human story from the minute He first breathed life into the first human soul. Are we able to recognize God as He walks with us? At some point we have to realize that there is only one way to satisfy the deepest longings of the human heart and that is in relationship with our Creator. We are called to this. However, we make the huge error of thinking that what we are hearing is coming from somewhere else. We become confused. Every human being would certainly profit with wisdom if they realized Who calls them and to Whom they belong.

Then and only then will we realize that it is only our Divine Master who can give us true vision and heal us. Once we recognize and reach out for the merciful presence of our loving Maker, we will be able to see with our soul, understanding the true nature and depth of all things. God's mercy is always available. It doesn't matter how far we have strayed or how blind we become, God patiently waits to console us, guide us and heal us. All we need to do is desire Him. Once we reach out, we also realize that there is no greater love to be found than God's, no human adventure that comes even close to the thrill of a spiritual search, and no human achievement even remotely as satisfying as union with Him.
