#### Mundelein Seminary Tolton Teaching Parish Program: Seminarian Updates

I am entering my second year here both at Mundelein and IC. Again, I am from the Wichita diocese in Kansas, where I attended college seminary at our House of Formation before coming up this way. I have three more years before, God willing, I am ordained a priest.

This summer, I lived at our House of Formation once again and studied Spanish with my brothers in my class and the class below me. I had not studied Spanish in five years, but it went remarkably well, and I managed to learn a good deal. Having more class during the summer was not my favorite summer experience, as there was not a lot of active ministry I was able to provide. On the other hand, I got to grow into the ministry of presence and let the Holy Spirit do His work, something I always need to work on. I experienced this most prominently with a Hispanic family who hosted me



for dinner twice a week. This was by far the best part of the summer, as they welcomed me into their family. This was a great opportunity to practice my Spanish, but also to learn about their culture and life in Mexico. As often happens in encounters between two different cultures when there is a language barrier, it also provided the opportunity for us to ask each other some very direct questions. We also got to go to various Hispanic ministry events in the evenings. I got to give a talk to the charismatic group. One of the major fruits of the summer was coming to know how much our two cultures have to offer each other. Growing up in an American Catholic context, especially one in which most people were descended from German farmers, there was a strong catechesis with a systematic understanding of the Faith and a strong emphasis on doing things right. It might be said that our motto was, "*If you love me, keep my commands*." The Hispanic culture, on the other hand, has a much more intimate and colorful view of who God is and what a relationship with Him looks like. There is also often a lesser understanding of the importance of the sacraments and a less organized approach to things in general. It might be said their approach is, "*the Word of God is near you, in your heart and on your lips*." In any case, this summer left me ready to serve in either context in the future, wherever I am needed.

Looking ahead to this year at IC, I look forward to being able to add to my experience of ministry, both by serving in whatever small way I can, and witnessing the service of others to their home parish. Please pray for me, and I will pray for all of you. - *Joseph Mick* 



Hello, my name is Jacob McGuire. I am a seminarian of the Diocese of Wichita in Kansas and I am starting my first year of Theology at Mundelein. I grew up in the country near Cherokee, a very small town located in the southeast corner of Kansas. I am the youngest of three and was raised in a family that deeply cared about the Faith and has continued to be very supportive of my discernment to the priesthood. I went to public school for most of my life, with college seminary being my first exposure to a Catholic school. There were only a few Catholics at the schools I went to growing up, so I didn't have much exposure to a Catholic community outside of my parish. However, I was involved at my parish from an early age, as I started serving right after First Communion and was involved with helping with Fish Frys and other parish fundraisers in middle and high school. It was towards the end of my sophomore year of high school that I first felt the call to discern the priesthood. Over the next couple of years, I prayed about it and found myself becoming more open to the possibility until

finally I decided to go to minor seminary after I graduated from high school.

For my four years of college seminary, I went to the House of Formation in Wichita, KS. It was started back in 2017 and is owned by the Diocese of Wichita. I went to a local Catholic university called Newman University for classes and had various opportunities to help minister to the people of my diocese. The House has several unique aspects compared to other minor seminaries, such as there being only seminarians from Wichita, and that we had to learn to cook and clean for ourselves. While this didn't give me any exposure to other dioceses, it gave me a ton of experience of my own; in fact, before entering seminary, I had never been to Wichita, which is the "*main*" city of the diocese. Being in Wichita for those four years helped me to know many priests and people of my diocese that I would have otherwise not met until after ordination. It also helped me to realize how important fraternity among brother seminarians is, which I am sure will become more important now that I am further away from some of them.

I hope that this gives a little bit of insight into who I am and how I got here. I am excited to be at Mundelein Seminary, and I am very excited to get to serve and be with all of you for the next few years. Please continue to pray for me and my brother seminarians as we continue to discern our vocation to the priesthood. – *Jacob McGuire*

## **CATHOLIC EDUCATION**

Liberia Mission educates over 500 students from kindergarten to university level who would otherwise have difficulty attending school. Students are formed in the Catholic faith and are taught to live purpose-driven lives, as they walk in the steps of Christ. Students also benefit from Leadership Development through the Soul-diers for Christ Outreach Ministry, where they complete acts of faith and service in their surrounding community.

#### **MICRO-BUSINESS**

The students attending St. Anthony benefit from a skills-based vocational education. Courses in carpentry, masonry, tailoring, animal husbandry and agriculture teach the practical skills needed to rebuild Liberia after its devastating 14-year civil war. ### Gospel Meditation - Encourage a Deeper Understanding of Scripture



Since God created human beings, we have struggled to keep our focus on God. We wrestle with the question of "*who is God*" and foolishly believe some of God's job description can be better completed by us. We wander in different directions, lose our way, think that happiness can be found elsewhere and even construct golden calves to worship. Are we simply too independent or just blatantly stubborn? It's a good question to ask. Even with all of our silliness and distractions, God compassionately and patiently waits. He lets us assert our wills and knows that perhaps one day we will actually wake up and realize how lost we are.

"Since happiness is nothing other than the enjoyment of the highest good and since the highest good is above, no one can be made happy unless he rises above himself, not by an ascent of the body but of the heart. But we cannot rise above ourselves unless a higher power lifts us up ... Divine aid is available to those who seek it from their hearts, humbly and devoutly; and this means to sigh for it in this valley of tears, through fervent prayer (St. Bonaventure)." One of the biggest human struggles is discerning what, exactly, is the highest good. We are ordered to achieve it but if we pursue it with clouded vision, we will never truly find it.

One of the greatest obstacles to God's power and love is a stubborn, closed heart of stone. When we are fiercely determined to set our sights elsewhere for happiness or simply ride the popular currents of the day, we will never satisfy the deep ache and longing within. We know that ache well. It is precisely why we scurry all over the place, attempting to find the next best thing to take away its pain. Nothing in the created world ever can or will. We continue our journey. One day, people may wake up and realize that they are grazing in the wrong pasture and putting themselves in harm's way. When this awakening occurs, it will be a most joyous day as we will see God's wide-open arms waiting to receive us. "*Lead me, Lord, in your path, and I will enter in your truth. Let my heart rejoice that it may fear your name* (St. Bonaventure)." ©LPi

#### Saint of The Week - Examples of Our Faith: Saint John Chrysostom (September 13th)

Born in Antioch in the 4<sup>th</sup> century, and raised by his widowed mother, Saint John received a rigorous classical education. He was first called to the ascetic life, even spending time as an anchorite living in a cave near Antioch. However, this life of extreme mortification was hard on his physical body, and he eventually returned to the city to recover.

Saint John was ordained in 298. He spent the next 12 years preaching in the Cathedral of Antioch, and it was most likely during this time that he earned the name Chrysostom which means "golden-mouthed."

In 397 or 398, he was made archbishop of Constantinople against his will. This post placed Saint John in the midst of imperial politics. But he would not be drawn in. He kept a modest household without extravagance and refused to serve the sumptuous suppers for political supplicants that predecessors in the position had. He preached against corruption and decadence and fought for the reform of clergy even deposing corrupt bishops.

Unfortunately, this high moral stance made enemies of powerful people at court and in the Church. They conspired against him and eventually Saint John was exiled to Armenia. He died in exile in 407. He was made a Father of the Church at the Council of Chalcedon in 451 and declared a Doctor of the Church in 1568. ©LPi
