Lost and Found...

Last weekend, I had the privilege of being installed as Pastor of Immaculate Conception. I had family and friends around me, in limited form, and I am sure our celebration would have been much bigger, had it been held under different circumstances. Many of you have also had to scale back weddings, graduations, birthday celebrations and the like during this time. It is certainly a form of loss.



As people left and we were half-asleep after a full day, we packed up the backyard. Shortly thereafter, my mom received a phone call informing her that her older sister (and my Godmother) had died after a lengthy and painful battle with cancer. All in all, it is a mix of bittersweet feelings, but we were comforted by the knowledge that she had died peacefully in her sleep and that we had prayed for her earlier during our Mass.

Faith, when it comes to death and our experiences with it, is incredibly powerful. I think that faith allows us to approach death without fear or doubt. Do we know exactly what happens to us after we die? Of course not—it's the veil that separates us. But I do take solace in a few passages that I keep close to my heart:

"Seventy years is the span of our days, or eight for those who are strong. ... Then teach us to number our days that we may gain wisdom of heart" (Psalm 90:10, 12).

"As a father has compassion on his children, the Lord's compassion is on those who fear him. For he knows of what we are made, he remembers we are dust" (Ps 103:13-14).

"For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who has similarly been tested in every way, yet without sin. So let us confidently approach the throne of grace to receive mercy and to find grace for timely help" (Hebrews 4:15-16).

There are many more such passages that come to mind, but the short of it for me is this:

God understands our struggle. He grieves because of sin and death too. But He sent Jesus, who subjected Himself to sin and death, making Himself lower than low, so that when He was raised and ascended, every aspect of our reality would be subject to Him. This means sin and death are powerless. It is impossible for them to capture someone who has faith and, in the sincerity of their heart, follows God to the best of their ability.

During my Installation Mass, Bishop Bartosic mentioned in his homily, quoting Therese of Lisieux, that some were created so they could love much and others only in little ways. But each in their own way could love fully – i.e., the Little Way. I think that is the second source of confidence for me in this period of change and loss – we are never impeded from loving to our capacity.

While we are limited now, the elderly, sick, and dying have been limited for a far longer time, but in many of them I have witnessed great, simple love. I saw this in my aunt as she was dying as well— the simple act of loving and being loved. Let this be the foundation of our faith and our thoughts, and we will never be lost.

Parish Operations...

When I took on the responsibility as Director of Operations over 15 months ago, I never imagined the challenges that would face our parish and community. COVID-19 has affected all of us. I must admit, the unprecedented disruption to Immaculate Conception Church had us worried. Our house, our place of prayer and worship, was no longer open to our congregation.



Services resumed slowly, as we livestreamed our daily Masses from a makeshift

office chapel. Over time, our online Masses were enhanced with incredible recorded music. Three months ago, we were able to re-open our church for in-person worship. It took a team of volunteers and a concerted effort to safely celebrate the Eucharist together again. We have come a long way, but it will take more time before we return to some degree of normalcy.

Re-opening our church was the first milestone. Summer was upon us and our focus shifted to bringing our students back to school. Sue Canzoneri, our Principal, and her staff spent the summer developing Policies and Procedures to re-open our school with the health, safety and well-being of our students, teachers and staff in mind. We have now successfully completed 5 weeks of school.

A complete Parish Financial Report will be forthcoming in late October with more detail. In the meantime, I would like to thank each of you for your support as we navigated these uncertain times. With your weekly giving, our Sunday Collections are within 3% of the same time last year. Through your effort to register for Give Central, mail-in or drop off your donations, we ended our Fiscal Year at \$636,980 compared to Fiscal Year 2019 donations of \$655,913. The generosity of our community is overwhelming. Thank You!

Throughout the quarantine, we have used the time to initiate some of the projects that have long been planned, without too much of a disruption. **Parish:**

- Installed new carpeting throughout our Church prior to resuming in-person services
- New carpeting has been installed in our Parish Offices.
- Finalized the insurance claim to repair the water damage to our Church ceiling. This project will be starting soon.
- The long-awaited project for our new Sound System and streaming capabilities has started. The work should be completed over the next 4-6 weeks.

School:

- Throughout the summer, maintenance and repairs to our air-conditioning system were completed. With the system running properly, we have avoided a costly chiller replacement.
- Contracted with a new cleaning company to continuously deep clean and sanitize our school. While this is an unexpected additional cost, it is necessary to keep our children and staff safe during this pandemic.
- 100 new chrome books were purchased to ensure each student in grades 4th-8th would have one and not have to share. We also purchased additional iPads for our lower grades.
- Installed a new Fire Alarm panel in our school to replace the original obsolete panel.

Our parish and school is a resilient community with a robust history. It is my privilege to be a part of the team at Immaculate Conception.

Gospel Meditation - Encourage a Deeper Understanding of Scripture



What prompts you to make the decisions you make? When confronted with a decision, whether one that is more trivial and mundane or one that is more significant and profound, we rely on guidance. That guidance can be the result of impulse and passion or the fruit of the interior voice of conscience. Decisions made on impulse and passion can be misguided and erroneous. Decisions based on conscience, or the moral voice within, will reflect the depth and maturity of our soul work. A more contemplative soul will make more contemplative

decisions. A less developed conscience will make decisions based on the individual's level of development.

Conversion and a change of heart are at the core of Jesus' message precisely because of this reality. We are works in progress. For the person on fire with the Holy Spirit and centered on God, life reflects an ever-deepening awareness and heightened sense of God's presence and a greater willingness to do God's will. What is happening internally is validated by what is witnessed externally. The hypocrite is the one who says yes when they really mean no. From the start, they had no desire to do the virtuous act but wanted to outwardly appear as if they did.

Where are you on the road of integrity? Honesty is all that is required. God is good with that. It is okay to struggle with our decisions and wrestle with ourselves. Consciences on the path to maturity and greater depth are not always going to know what action is immediately best. We may, at first, say no to what we know is right and, after prayerful reflection and thought, come around to doing it. Conversion happens when our no changes to yes, regardless of how sinful or out of sync we may be at the time. God is anxious to welcome us to Himself. But we cannot embrace Him unless we want to. Learning to orient our gift of free will to what is of divine origin, right, and best is a discipline we must always tweak and perfect.

If we fool ourselves into thinking we are someone we are not, it can become difficult to see the truth. We need to look for the fruit in our lives. We need to make sure our desires and thoughts are moving us to act. You know that other saying about intentions, don't you? Don't pave the road to a place no one wants to end up with your intentions. Instead, let your intentions and actions lead others to another place where Jesus can be found.
